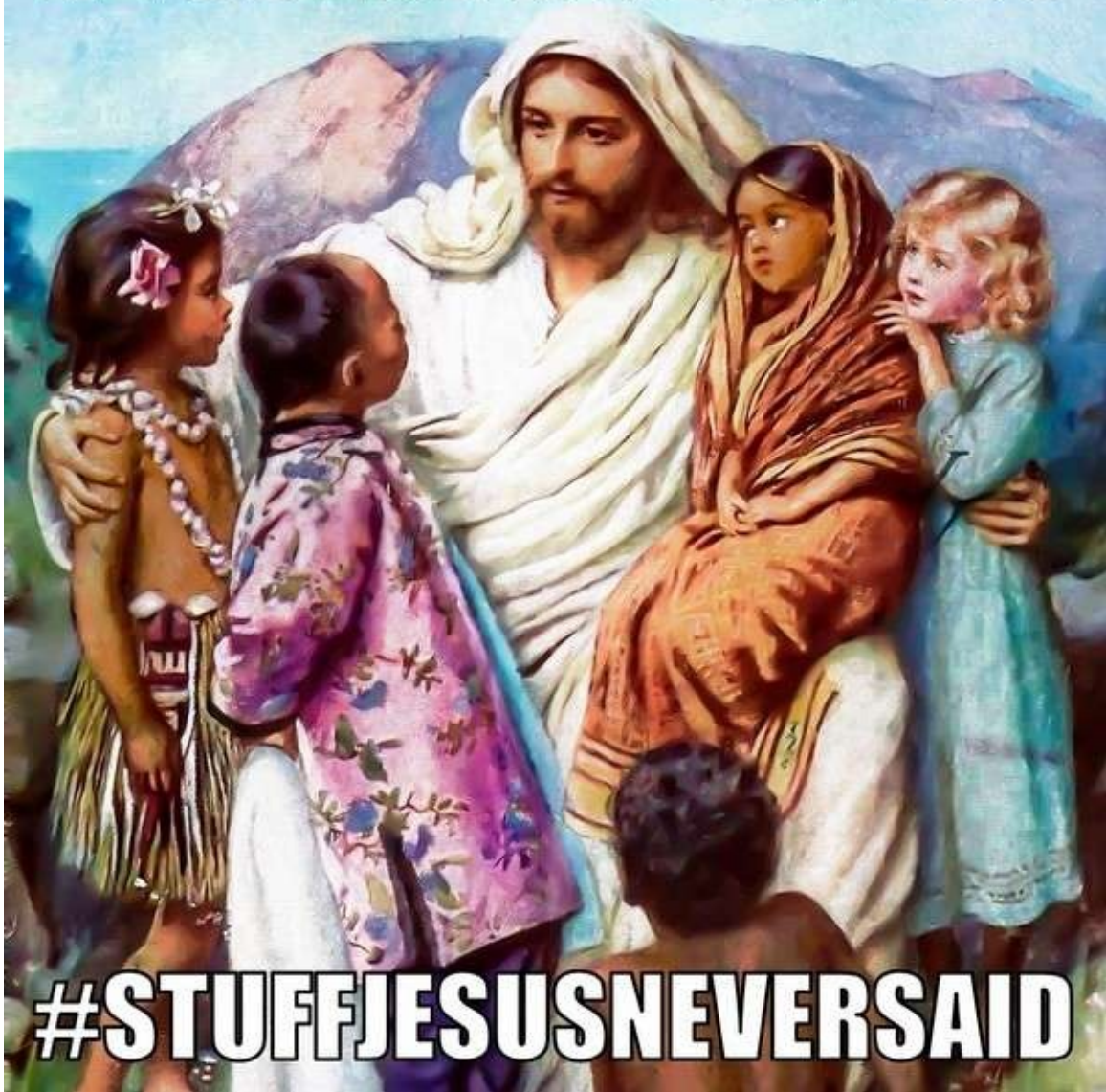

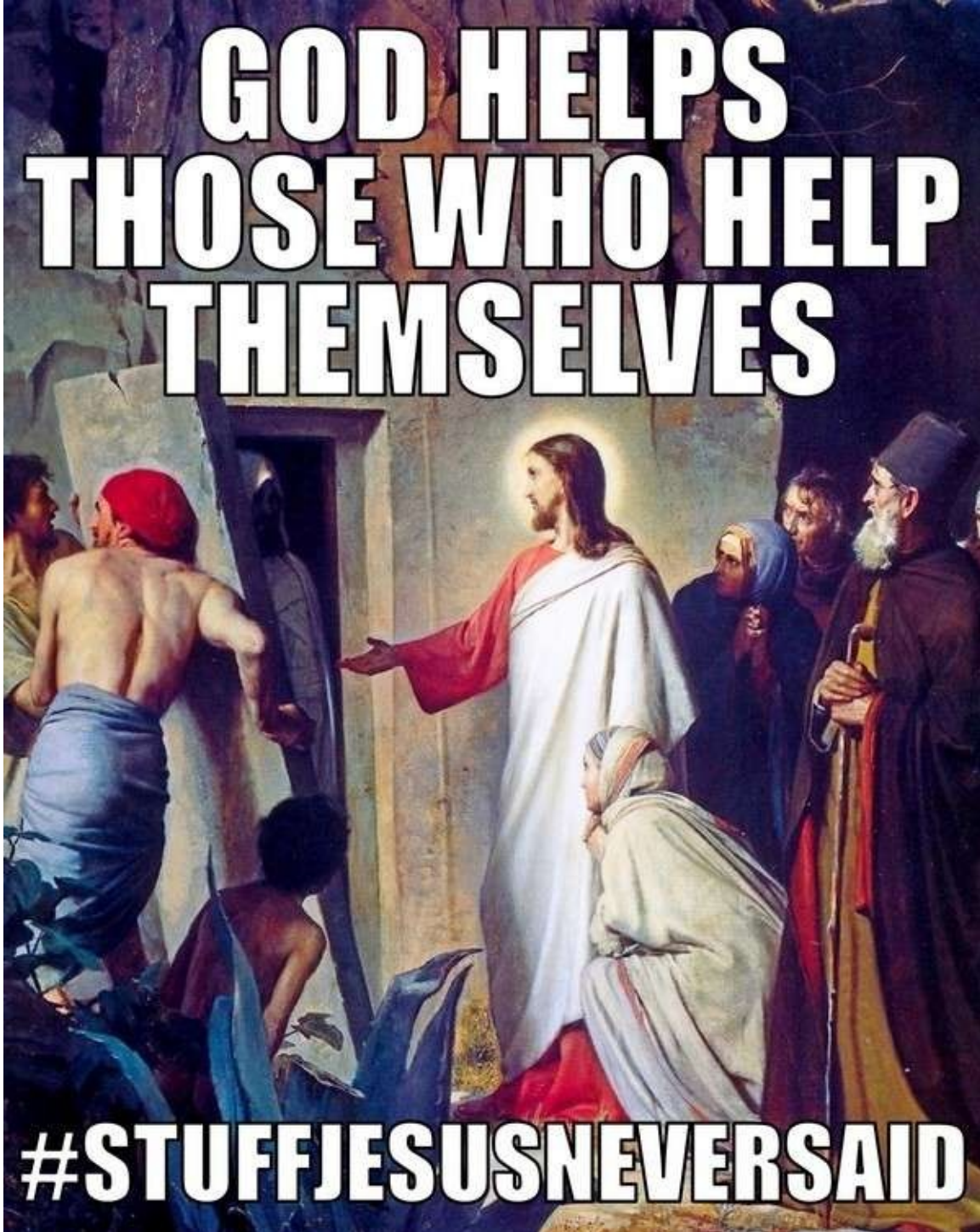
How did he do it? On the cross God dropped an atom bomb of wrath on our sin. The sin that condemned us, he condemned, and now there is nothing left to condemn.

God surely wants to help everyone, but only the helpless receive his help.

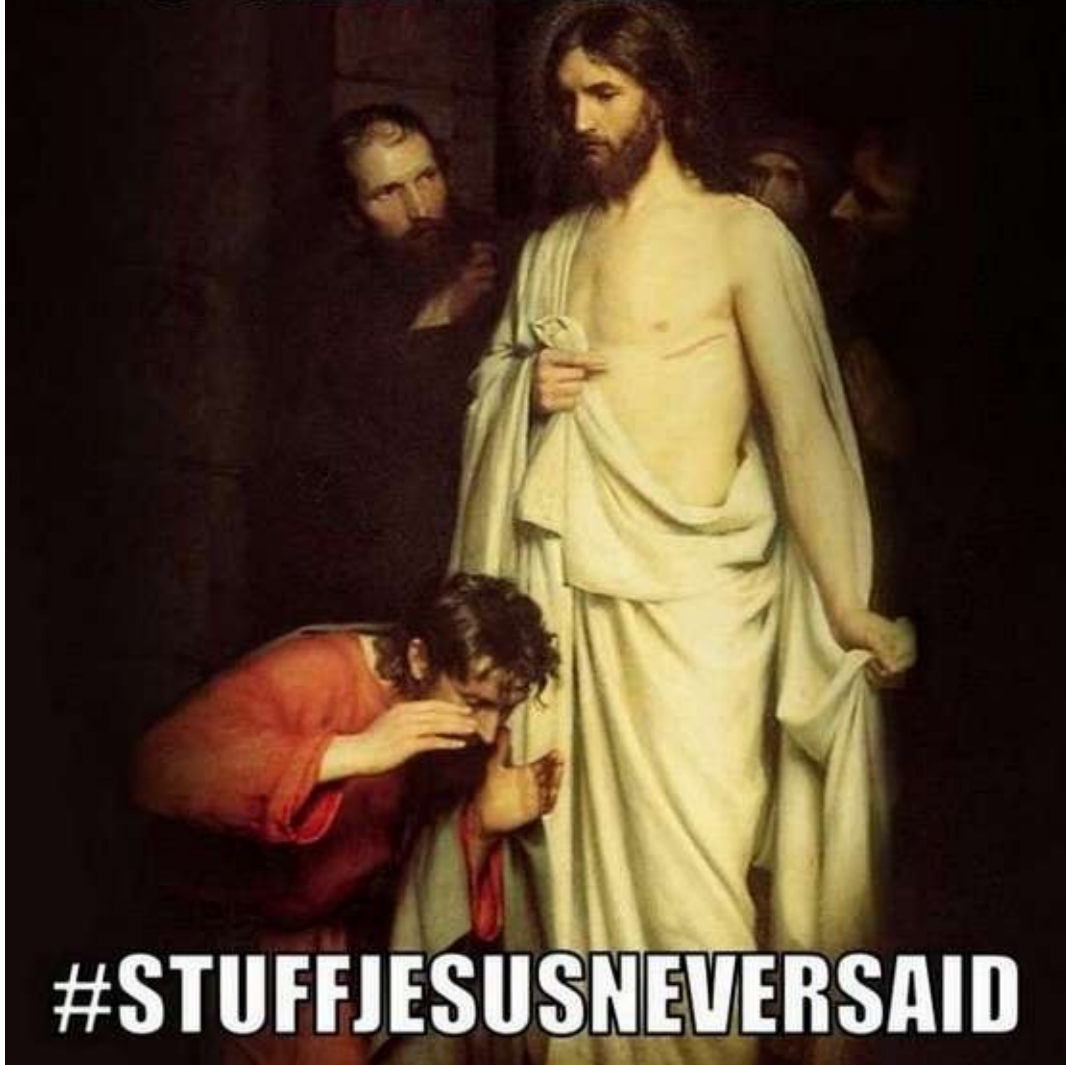

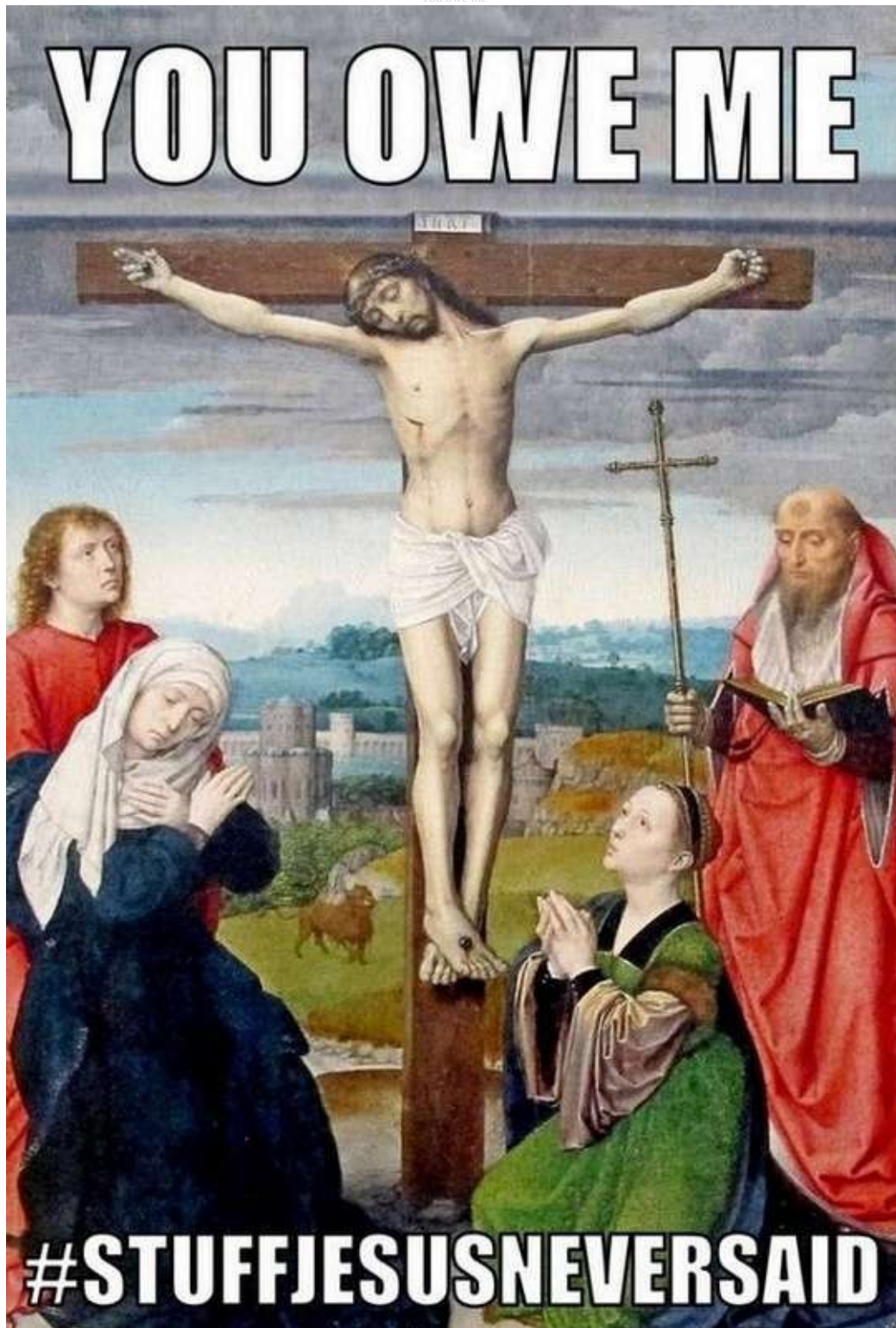

Jesus would disagree.

Jesus had a thing for lepers. He healed so many! He did this to show us that his heart is always for the broken and hurting and those outside the camp. His heart is for those who can't get out of bed and whose medicine cabinets are full of Zoloft and Prozac.

ALL IS A GIFT

In this life we have many debts. We owe taxes, school fees, student loans, car payments, mortgage bills, credit cards, utilities, and more. Being in debt can put stress on your health and marriage. A heavy debt can make you sick. An unsettled debt can sink a friendship.

So how is it good news to hear Jesus say, “You owe me everything”?

This is not good news, yet it is the message many hear. “Jesus died for you, what will you do for him?”

The message of *quid pro quo* will make you conscious of your debt to Christ, but the good news of grace declares, “All is a gift.” There is no debt. God holds nothing against you.

Under the old laws of Israel, the Jews were supposed to celebrate the Year of Jubilee. Every fifty years they were to free slaves, cancel debts, and proclaim liberty throughout the land. Yet they never did it.

Then Jesus showed up and said, “The Spirit of the Lord is on me to proclaim the year of the Lord’s favor.” In other words, “This is the year of Jubilee. All debts against God are forgiven. The slaves of sin are free.”

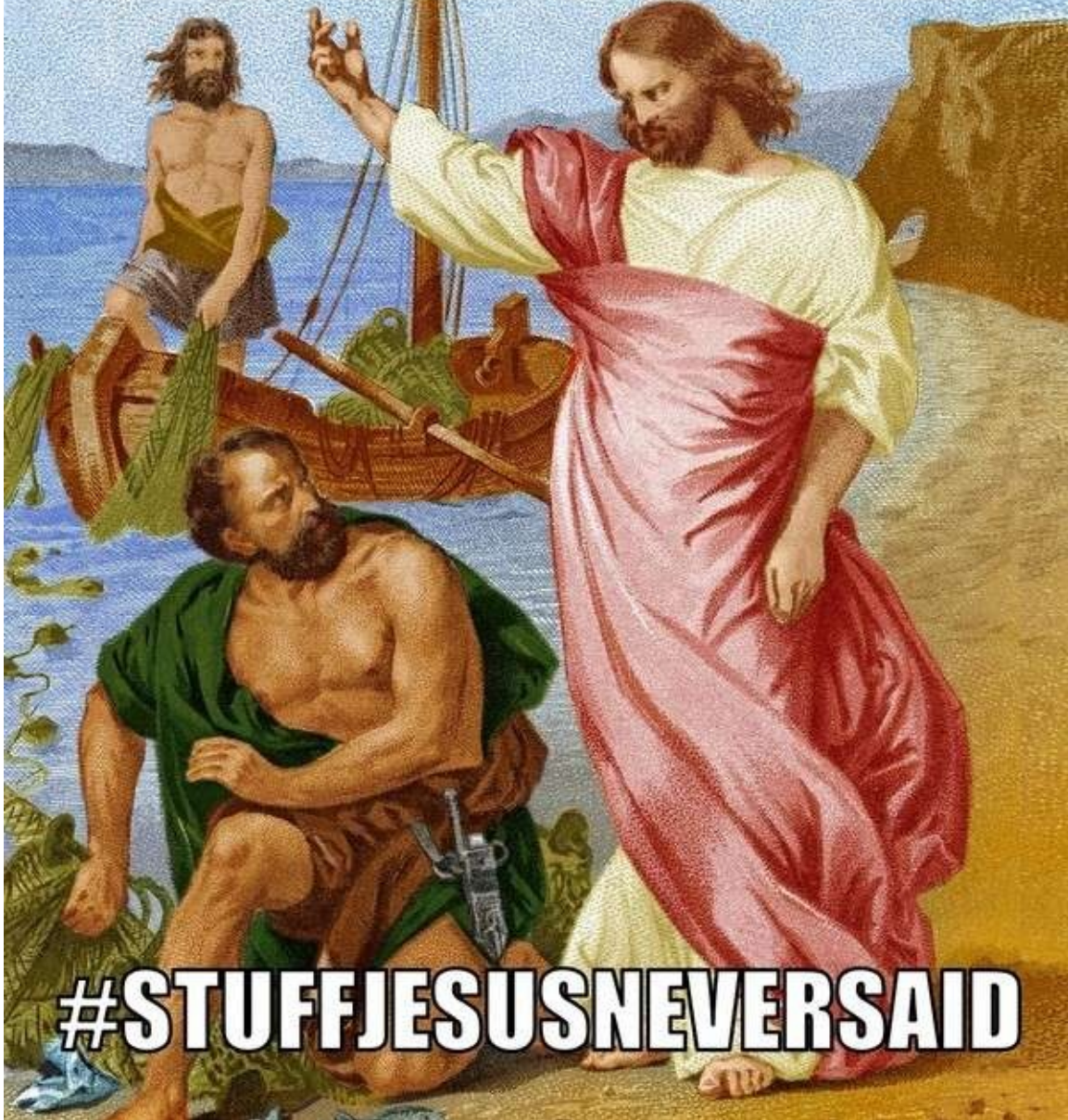

"I cannot come in," we say. "I've done some bad stuff." And God replies, "I hold nothing against you."

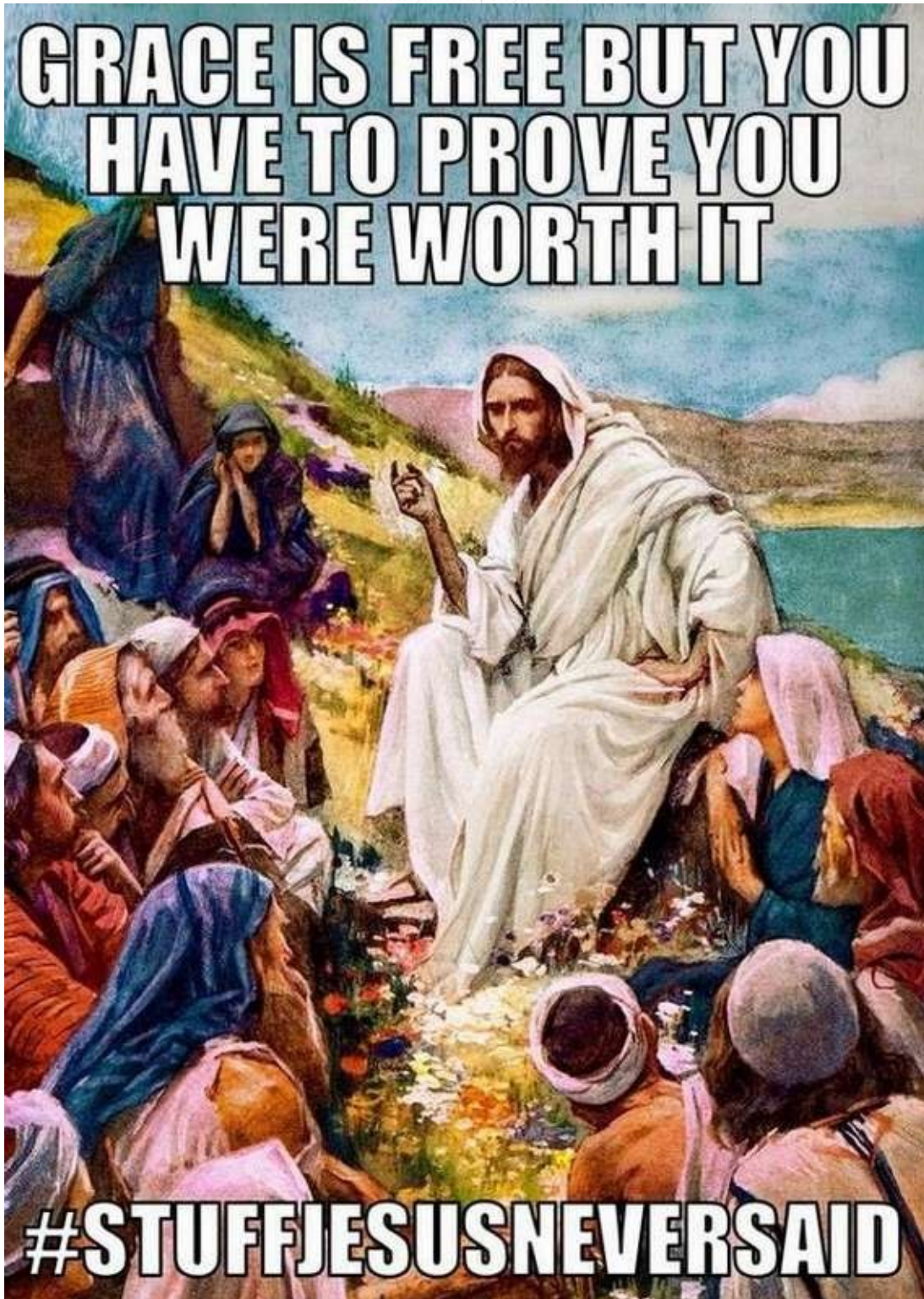
"But haven't you seen what I did?" And God replies, "Haven't you seen what *Jesus* did?"

Instead, he said, "I have come that you might have life to the full."

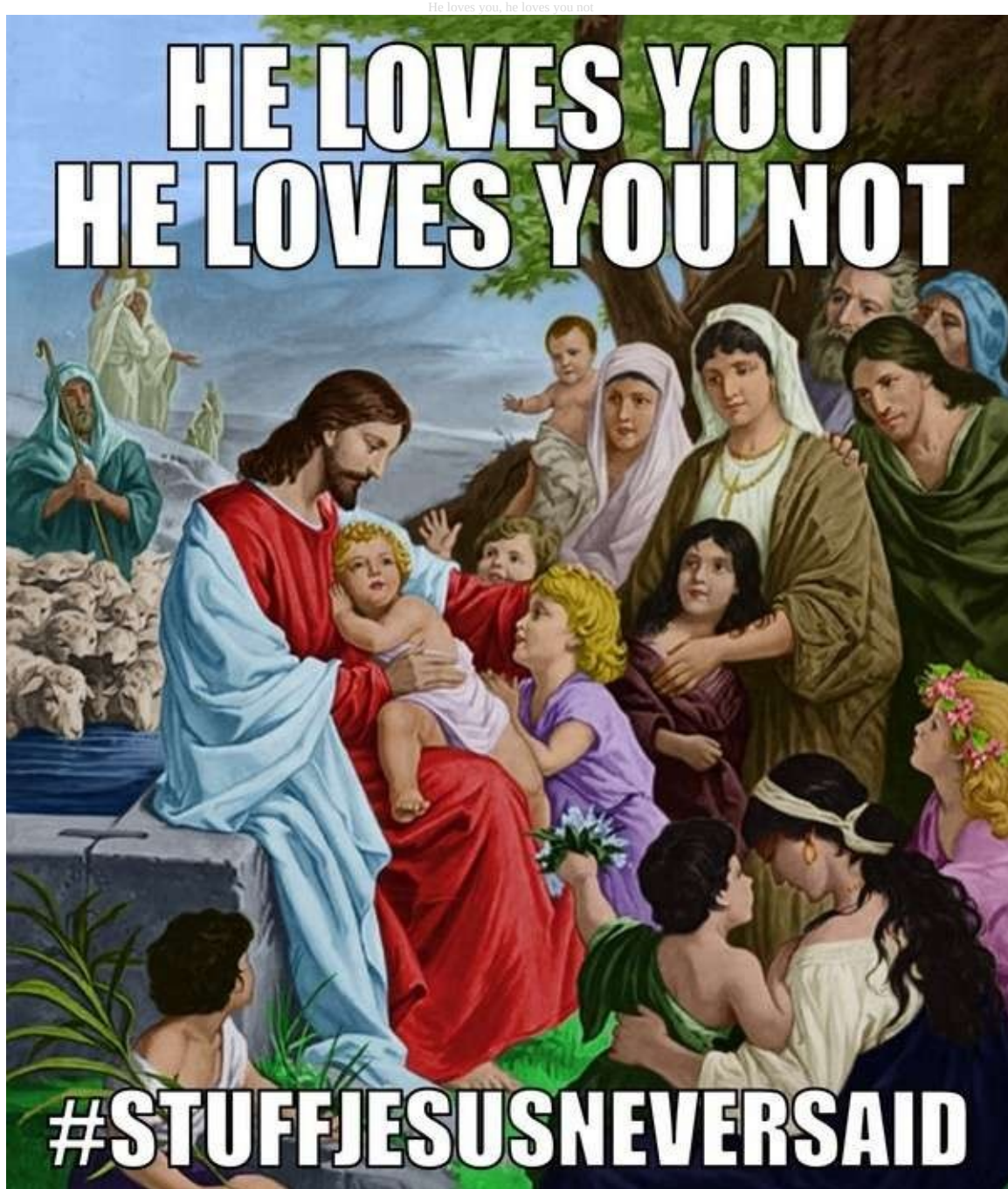

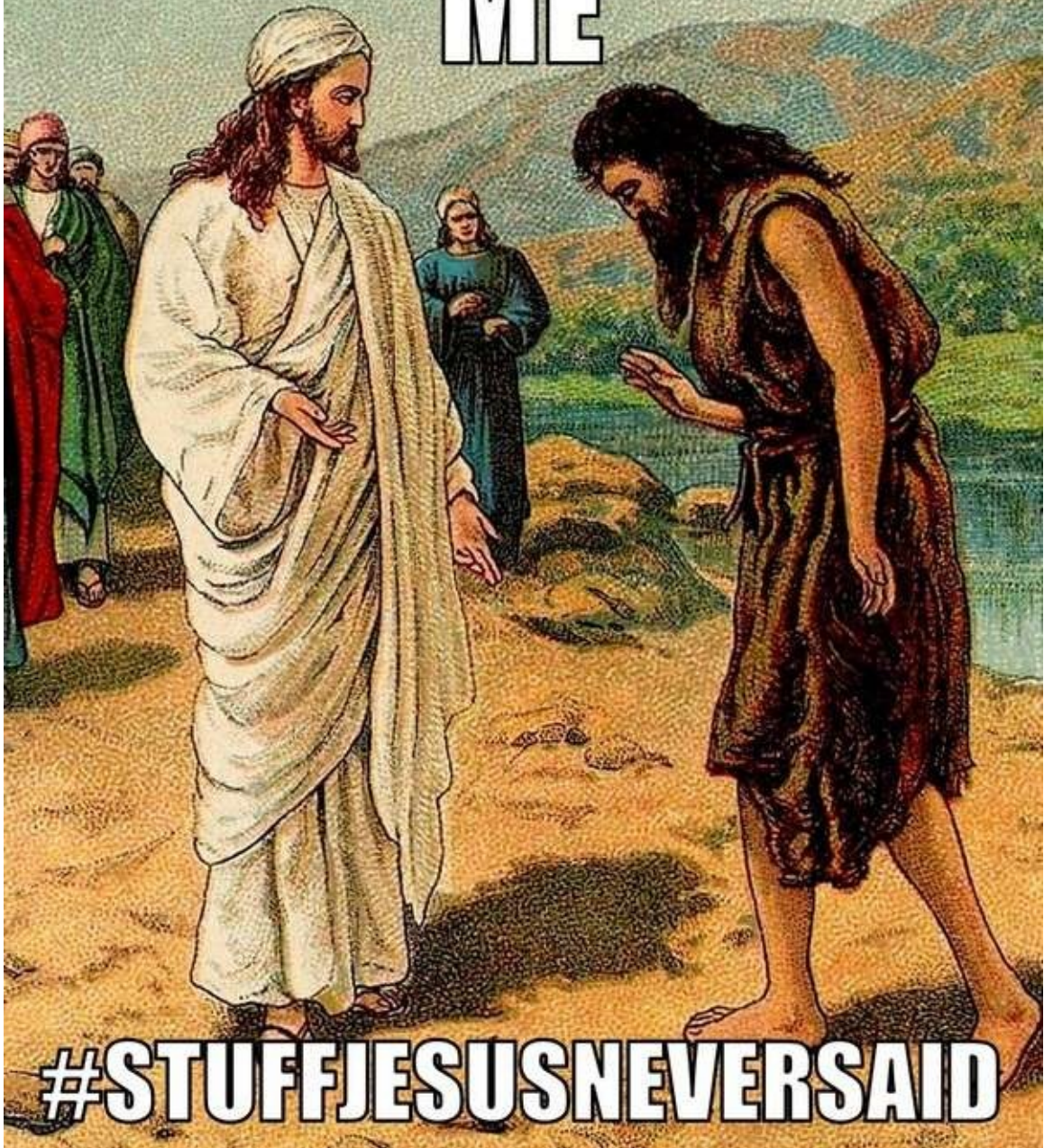

Do you know why God will never be disappointed with you? It is not because he has low expectations or no hopes and dreams for you. It's because his hopes and dreams always come true.

GOD IS NOT A SLOT MACHINE

“Sow into this ministry and you will reap threefold, sevenfold, even tenfold of

your investment.” You hear stuff like this on TV, but Jesus never said it. The God Jesus revealed is not a divine slot machine who rewards punters with payouts.

“You can’t out give God.” “Give and God will bless you.” “God is no man’s debtor.” When lines like these are used to promote giving, they destroy it, for giving-to-get is not giving at all.

“But didn’t Jesus say, ‘Give, and it shall be given unto you, and with the measure you use, it will be measured to you’?”

Jesus was talking about our giving to each other. When we are generous with others, others will be generous with us. But if we’re stingy they won’t be. It’s the golden rule and it’s a good way to live.

But God lives by a higher standard. He gives to us before we have given him a thing, and he gives with no expectation of reward. Why does he do it? Because God is love and love gives. God does not do debt, and God does not give to get. He gives because it’s his nature to give.

Jesus said, “Love your enemies, do good and lend to them without expecting to get anything back, then you will be children of the Most High.” When we give with no expectation of return we’re acting just like our Father.

The children of a generous Father don’t need to be prodded or manipulated into giving. They give because it’s in their nature. They give because God gave first.

“It is more blessed to give than to receive.” **Acts 20:35**



GOD BELIEVES IN YOU

Every investor knows that you shouldn't throw good money after bad. If an

investment turns sour, you cut your losses and walk away. So what does that tell us about a God who never writes us off but pursues us with love?

When Adam ate the forbidden fruit, God didn't wash his hands of the human race. And when you make mistakes, he doesn't zap you with lightning. Instead, he gives you grace.

Either God is a lousy investor, or he has faith in you. Big time. No matter what you've done, you are worth more to him than anything, even his own life. The cross is the proof. Before you had done anything good, Christ died for you.

Do you realize what this means? God believes in you!

You won't hear this message from those preaching self-improvement. Instead you will be asked, "Do you believe in God?" And if you hesitate to answer, you will be manipulated with carrots and sticks. "Believe and be blessed, deny and be damned."

But this is not love. Love makes no threats. Love doesn't force itself on others.

A back-to-front gospel says, "Believe or burn," but Jesus declares, "God believes in you." Is this not the greatest revelation of all? Everything God has ever done testifies to his love for us. The garden, the tree, the cross—he did it all because he loves us and believes in us and is not willing that any of us should perish. His enduring hope is that we will stop doubting his intentions and receive his love.

Your life might be one big mountain of mistakes, but you are not a mistake. You are the object of your Father's affection and the apple of his eye.

JESUS IS THE GREAT PHYSICIAN

The woman with the hemorrhage wasted her life's savings on doctors who couldn't heal her, then she met Dr. Jesus who could. And from this one story, good doctors have lost customers and good people have lost their lives.

There's no such thing as a bad healing. If medicine helps, take your medicine. If an x-ray is useful, get an x-ray.

Jesus had nothing against doctors and good doctors have nothing against Jesus. The two New Testament books containing the most stories of supernatural healing were both written by a doctor.

But beware the doctor who offers no hope. There is always hope. If medical science pronounces the sentence of death over you, get a second opinion. Go to Dr. Jesus. If your mind is anxious and afraid, find out what he says.

Jesus is the Great Physician. Nothing is too hard for him. Regular doctors give a measure of help, but the Great Physician gives great help. Not even death can stop him.

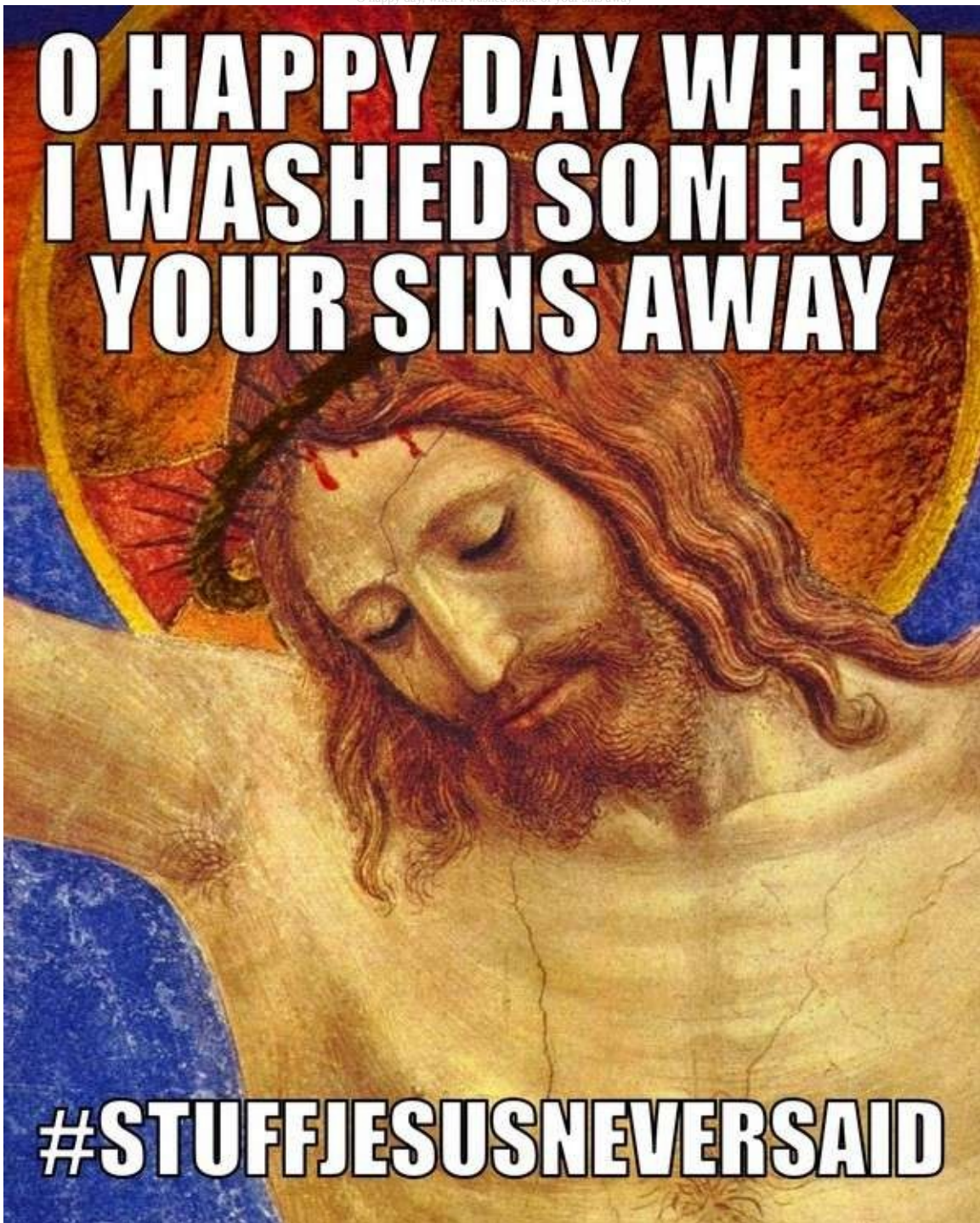

After Jesus rose from the dead he instructed his disciples to proclaim the

forgiveness of sins to the whole world, beginning in Jerusalem. To forgive means to send away, which is what the Lamb of God did when he went to the cross. He carried our sins and bore them away.

Forgiveness is not something God does; it's something he's done. Past tense. Finished. Complete. Job done.

The apostles travelled the world proclaiming the forgiveness of sins. They encouraged people to receive the forgiveness provided by Jesus.

“Little children,” said John, “I write to you because your sins are forgiven.”

“My friends,” said Paul in Asia Minor, “I want you to know that through Jesus the forgiveness of sins is proclaimed to you.”

However, some people didn't like this message of free forgiveness, and they drove Paul out of town. Even today there are those who say only some of your sins are forgiven. “God has forgiven your past sins, but your current and future sins demand payment.”

But if the blood of Jesus did not pay for all your sins, what will?

Forgiveness is not something you earn through acts of piety or penance. Nor is it a debit card to draw upon as though God's grace was locked away. The forgiveness Jesus spoke of is a gift to receive and in Christ you have it.

“How far has the Lord taken our sins from us? Farther than the distance from east to west!” **Psalm 103:12 (CEV)**

Here are some things Jesus didn't say about communion. "When you take communion, take a moment to remember how you stole stationery from the office. Remember how you cursed that queue-jumper. Remember how you cheated on your tax. Remember how you looked at naughty stuff online.

"Remember how you didn't read the Bible this week. Remember how you fought with your spouse and yelled at the kids.

"Remember how you're a lousy human being."

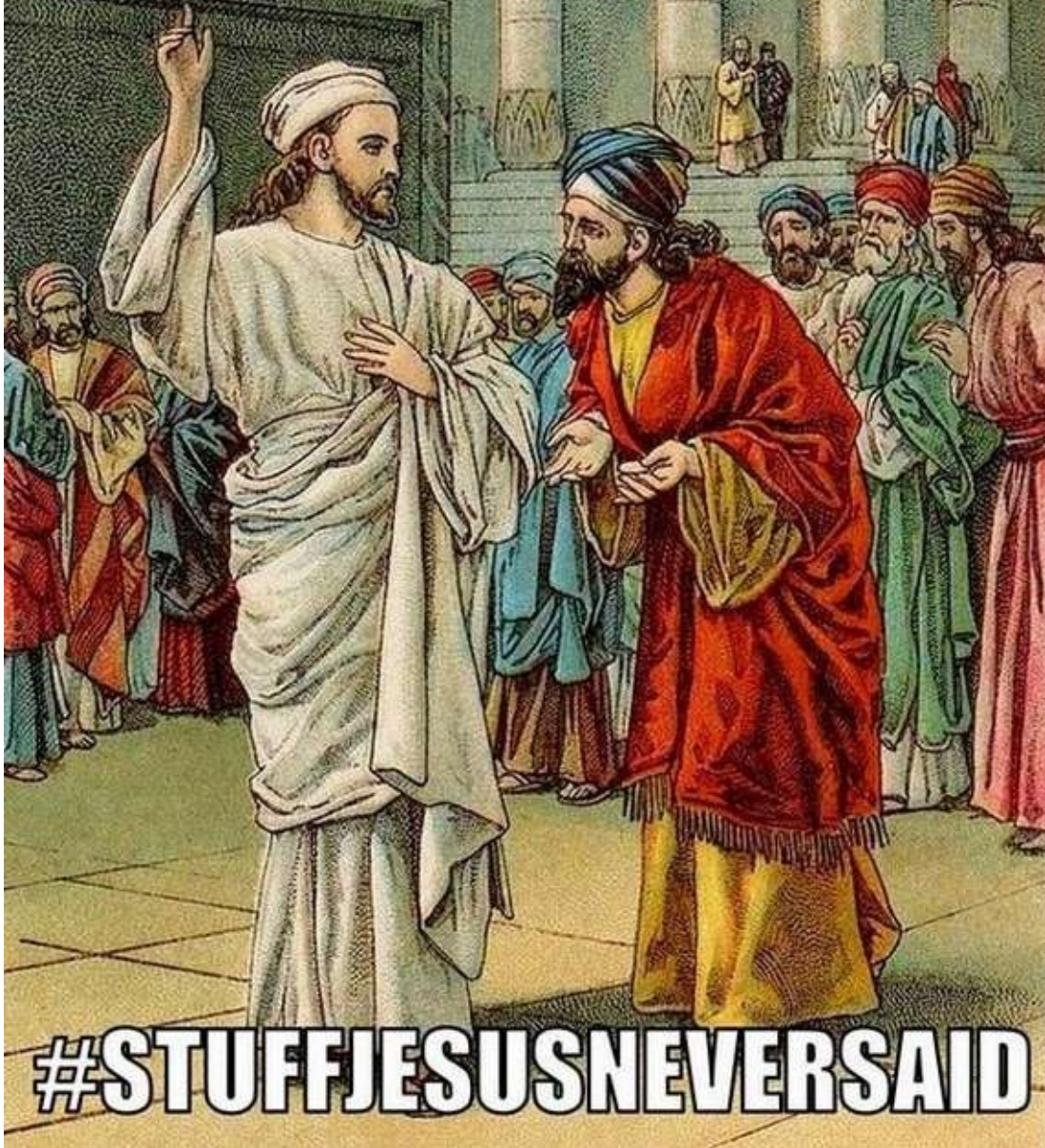
“Remember my body, broken that you might be whole. Remember my blood, poured out that you might be forgiven.

A woman with a bad reputation showed up at a private dinner party and broke a jar of perfume over Jesus' feet. The host was shocked. "If Jesus were a prophet," he said to himself, "he'd know what sort of woman this was."

But Jesus did know for he said to the man, "Her sins, which are many, have been forgiven." Then turning to the woman he said, "Your sins are forgiven."

This woman was a sinner and then she wasn't. She had sins and then she didn't, because Jesus exchanged them for his gift of forgiveness.

The man was scandalized by Christ's forgiveness. It didn't make sense. "She's a sinner, not an upstanding citizen like me."

Perhaps he comforted himself by thinking, "God's given her a fresh start. Good for her. But to maintain her forgiveness she needs to straighten up and fly right, otherwise she'll fly right out of his forgiveness."

In other words, God's forgiveness is a fragile thing that falls apart at the first sign of trouble. You have to work to stay forgiven. You have to be good or God will unforgive you.

But that's not what Jesus said. "Your sins are forgiven," meaning all of them. Not just the ones you did yesterday, but those you did today and those you will do tomorrow.

You are forgiven. Jesus said so. Your forgiven-ness has nothing to do with how good you are, but how good he is.

"In him we have ... the forgiveness of sins, in accordance with the riches of God's grace." **Ephesians 1:7**

Late one day, Jesus and the disciples came to a Samaritan village that refused them hospitality. “Lord, shall we call down fire from heaven, as Elijah did?” said James and John. Jesus rebuked them. “That’s not why I’m here. I came to save, not destroy.”

The Samaritans and Jews hated each other on account of religious differences. Jesus took no part in their dispute but loved indiscriminately. He ministered to Jews and Samaritans. To correct racial stereotypes he told the Jews stories where Samaritans were unexpectedly good guys.

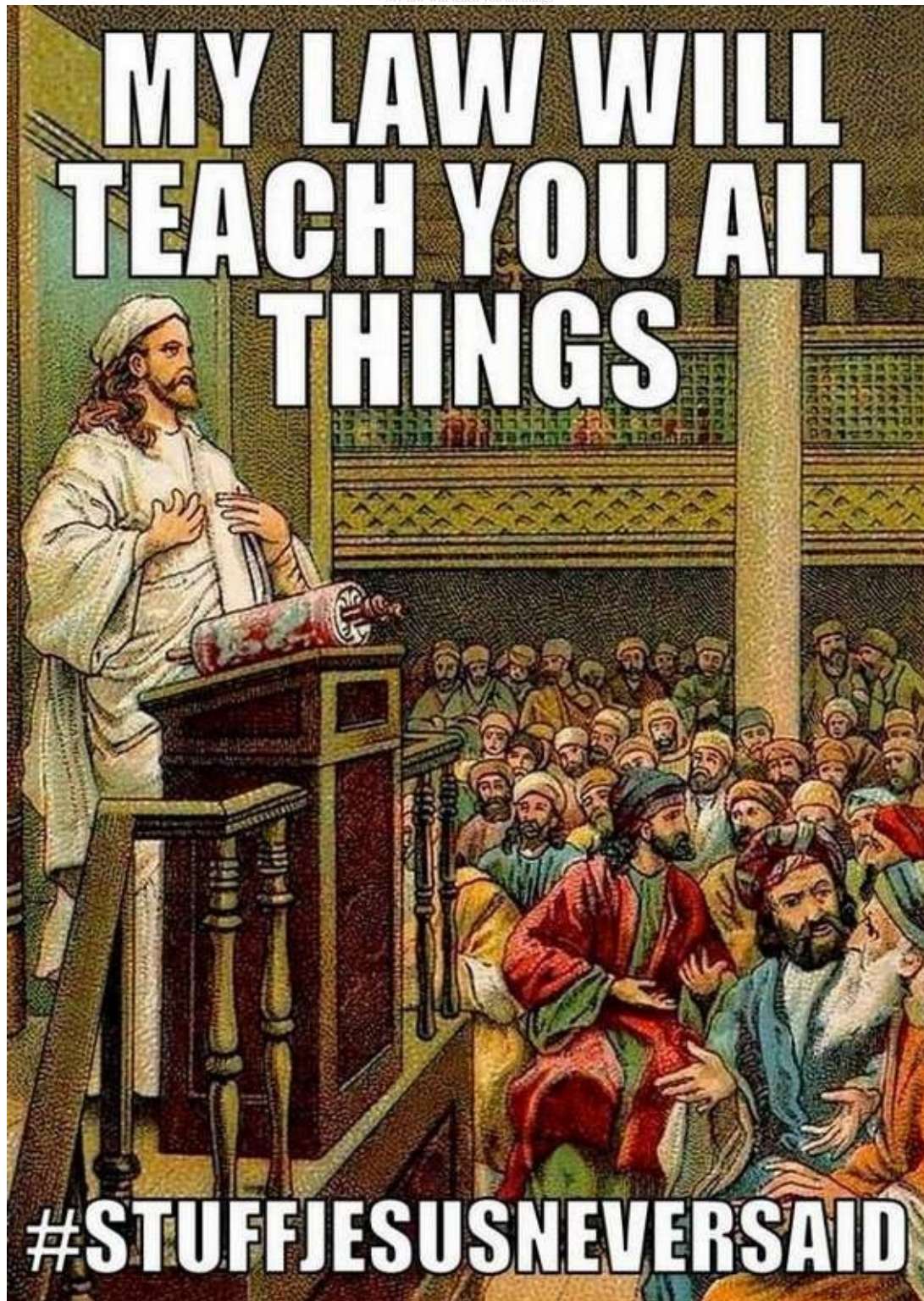
In the end, Jesus was treated worse by his own tribe, the Jews. Yet even in death he refused to play the punishment game. Those who opposed him he loved to his dying breath, and when he rose from the dead he did not seek revenge.

In the narrative of your life you may see yourself as an enemy of God. When bad things happen you tell yourself, “God hates me. God is punishing me.”

But Jesus tells a different story. In his version you are not the villain but the unexpectedly good guy, worth loving, worth dying for.

“I did not come to judge the world, but to save the world.” **John 12:47**

My law will teach you all things



THE LAW POINTS TO JESUS

Imagine you have a clumsy servant. For as long as he sits, his clumsiness is not apparent. But as soon as you give him something to do, the trouble begins. He spills the soup. He smashes a vase. He tumbles down the stairs and breaks his legs.

Ask him to do nothing, and the poor man is fine. But as soon as he is given an instruction, he goes to pieces. There is nothing wrong with the instruction. The problem is with the man. And so it is with us who are sinners by nature.

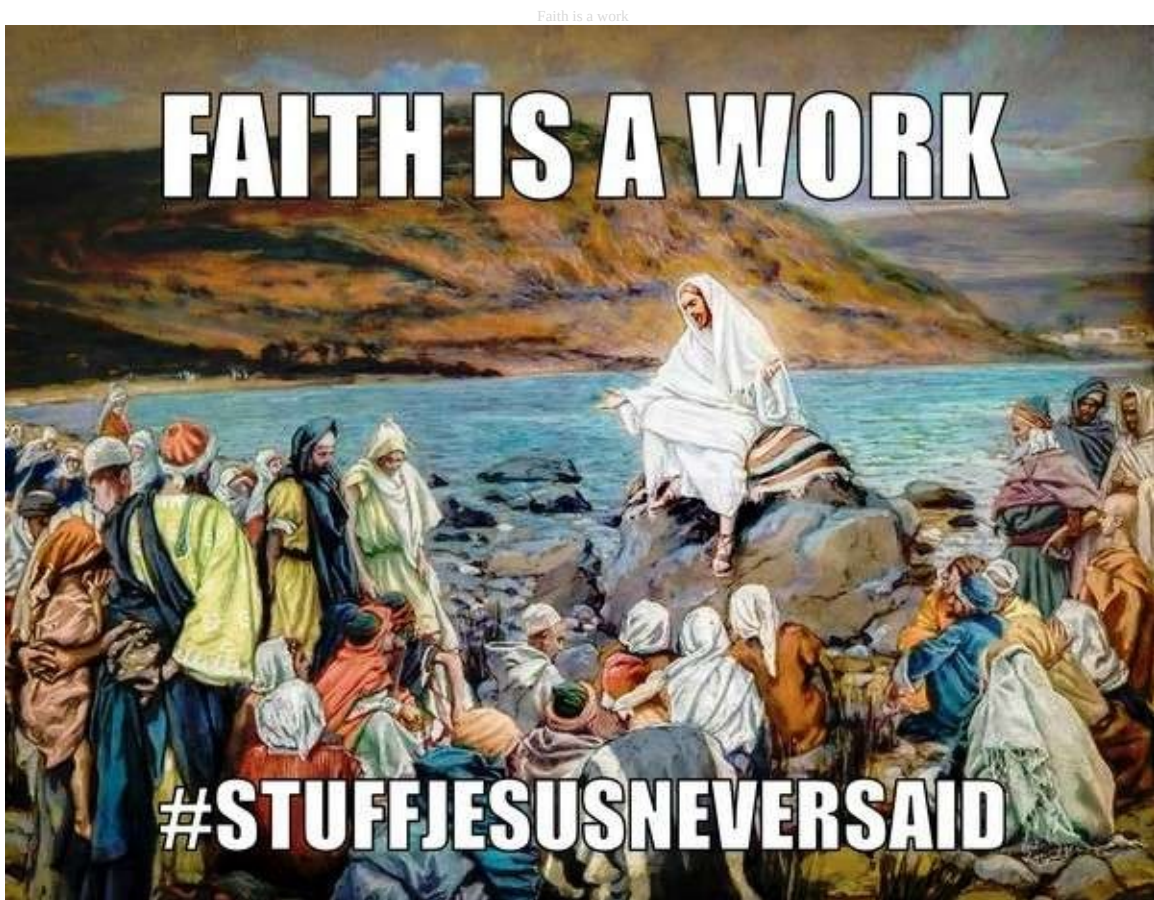
If God asks nothing of us, all seems to go well, but as soon as he demands something of us, the occasion is provided for a grand display of our sinfulness. We cannot live up to the standard. His requirements are too high. No matter how hard we try, we stumble and make a hash of things.

What does God's law teach us? One thing and one thing only: The law reveals our shortcomings. The law exposes our need for grace.

"But I'm doing my best." Your best is not good enough. God demands perfection and nothing less. Jesus said, "Be perfect as your Father in heaven is perfect."

Perfection. What the law demands, Jesus supplies. Either you must be perfect, or have a high priest who is perfect for you.

"We have a high priest (Jesus) who perfectly fits our needs." **Hebrews 7:26 (MSG)**



FAITH IS A REST

Jesus and his disciples were crossing a lake when a squall blew up. Within minutes the boat was swamped and their lives were in danger. The disciples leapt into action. They furled and rowed and bailed and achieved absolutely nothing.

When all seemed lost the disciples woke the Lord. With a word he rebuked the wind and the storm subsided. Then he rebuked the disciples for their lack of faith.

The disciples worked and Jesus slept and only one of them had faith.

Faith is not a work but a rest. Faith is being persuaded that God is who he says he is and will do what he said he would.

At the start of their boat trip, the Son of God said, “Let us go to the other side.” This was the word of the Lord, but the disciples weren’t persuaded. “We’re not going anywhere but down.” Being unpersuaded, they worked hard and achieved nothing. But Christ, being fully persuaded, could sleep in peace.

This is why faith is a rest. When you are fully persuaded about what God has promised, the issue is settled. Your mind is made up and your heart is at ease. But if you are not persuaded, you’ll be restless. You’ll try instead of trust. You’ll be panicky instead of peaceful.

Faith is not something you must do or manufacture. Faith is resting in the restful persuasion that God is greater than our storms. Faith is refusing to panic and choosing to trust that he will safely bear us to the other side.

“We who have believed enter his rest.” **Hebrews 4:3 (paraphrase)**

GRACE IS FOR CHILDREN

When Jesus heard that Jairus' little girl had died, he did not say, "She was sick—her death is a mercy." When Jesus met a widow on her way to bury her son, he did not comfort her with, "God took him because you loved him too much."

And if Jesus had met a mother who had miscarried her child, he would not have uttered lines like these:

"God wasn't ready for your baby to be born."

"God needed another flower for his bouquet."

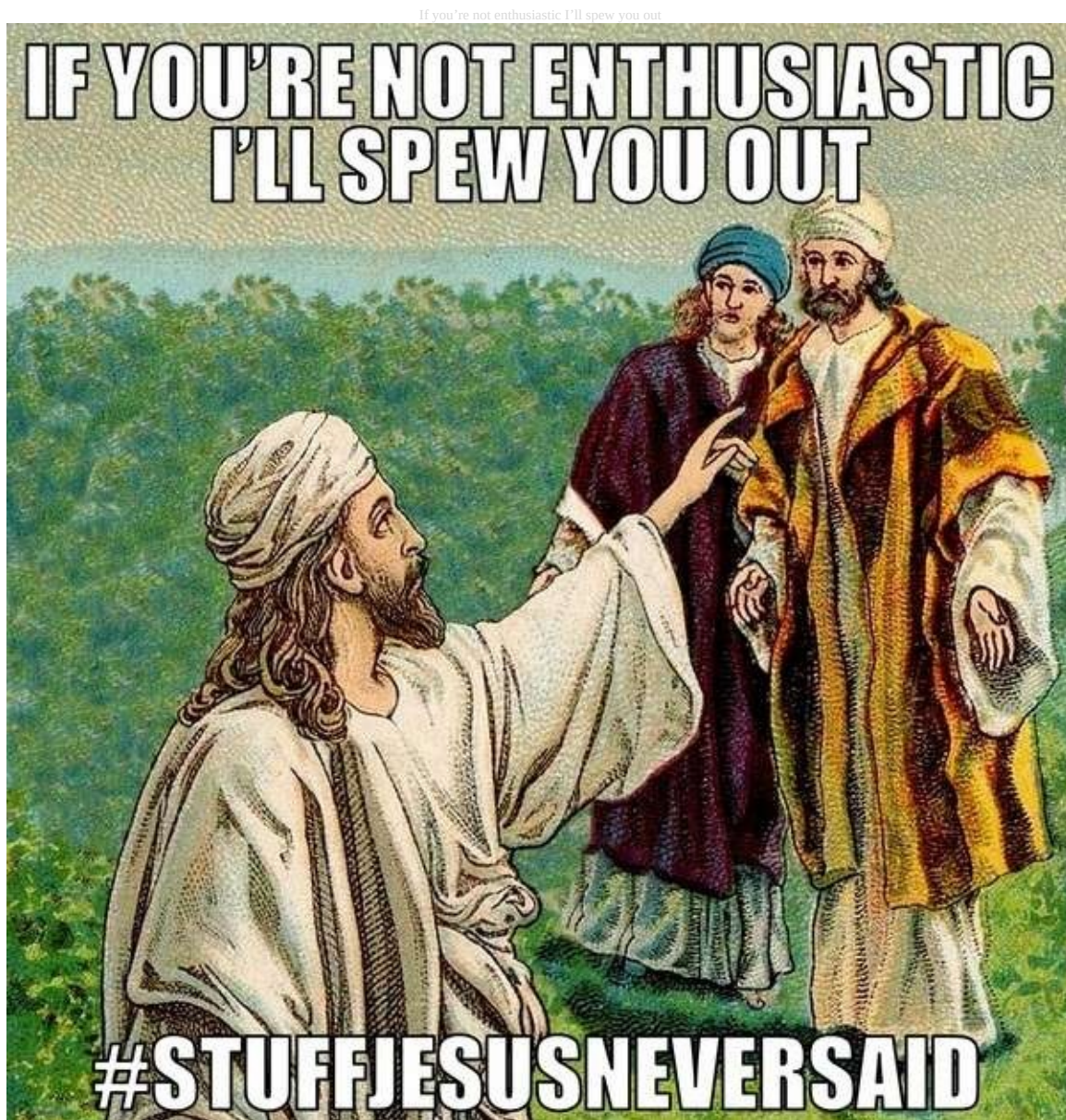
"There must have been something wrong with your child. This was a blessing in disguise."

Jesus never blamed God or suggested his hand was behind the loss of a child. A miscarriage might happen for a number of reasons, but God needing another angel in heaven is not one of them.

Some have this idea that death is one of God's tools, but Jesus hated death. He told the widow not to cry, yet he wept at the tomb of Lazarus. He told Jairus not to be afraid, yet he was overwhelmed with sorrow in the garden. But on the cross the Author of life bore our sins and removed the sting of death. Because of Jesus, death is no longer something to fear.

What happens to babies who die? They go to be with Jesus, every single one. Because if grace is for anyone, it's for the least and the lost.

"The kingdom of God belongs to such as these." **Luke 18:16**



JESUS WANTS YOU TO REST

If God gave points for enthusiasm the disciples would be in trouble. On the night when Christ needed them most, they fell asleep on the job. Then when trouble came they ran like frightened kittens.

Yet instead of condemning the disciples for being lousy, lukewarm friends, Christ died for them. Then he rose from the dead and cooked them breakfast.

In our performance-mad world it's easy to believe that Jesus wants us to work harder, run faster, and jump higher. But more than ever we need to hear him say, as he did to the disciples, "Come with me to a quiet place and get some rest."

When Jesus said the lukewarm would be spat out, he was talking about the dangers of mixing hot with cold. To be lukewarm is to mix that which should never be mixed. It's mixing the new covenant of grace with the old covenant of works. It's mixing the rest Christ offers with the ceaseless demands of the law. It's mixing the unbreakable promises of God with the brittle promises of man.

Charles Spurgeon, the great preacher of the Victorian era, worried about those who muddled the good news of grace with the bad news of the law.

"Most of them make a mingle-mangle, and serve out deadly portions to the people, often containing but one ounce of gospel to a pound of law, whereas even a grain of law is enough to spoil the whole thing."

What makes Jesus sick? It's mixing grace with law, his sacrifice with yours. It's saying, "Jesus, I got this. You started it, but I'll finish it. You can't do this, but I can."

Such talk is nauseating to Jesus and deadly to us.

"Only crazy people would think they could complete by their own efforts what was begun by God." **Galatians 3:3 (MSG)**

"I don't condemn you," said Jesus. "Go now and leave your life of sin." This was not a threat, but a declaration of freedom. "Leave your prison of sin."

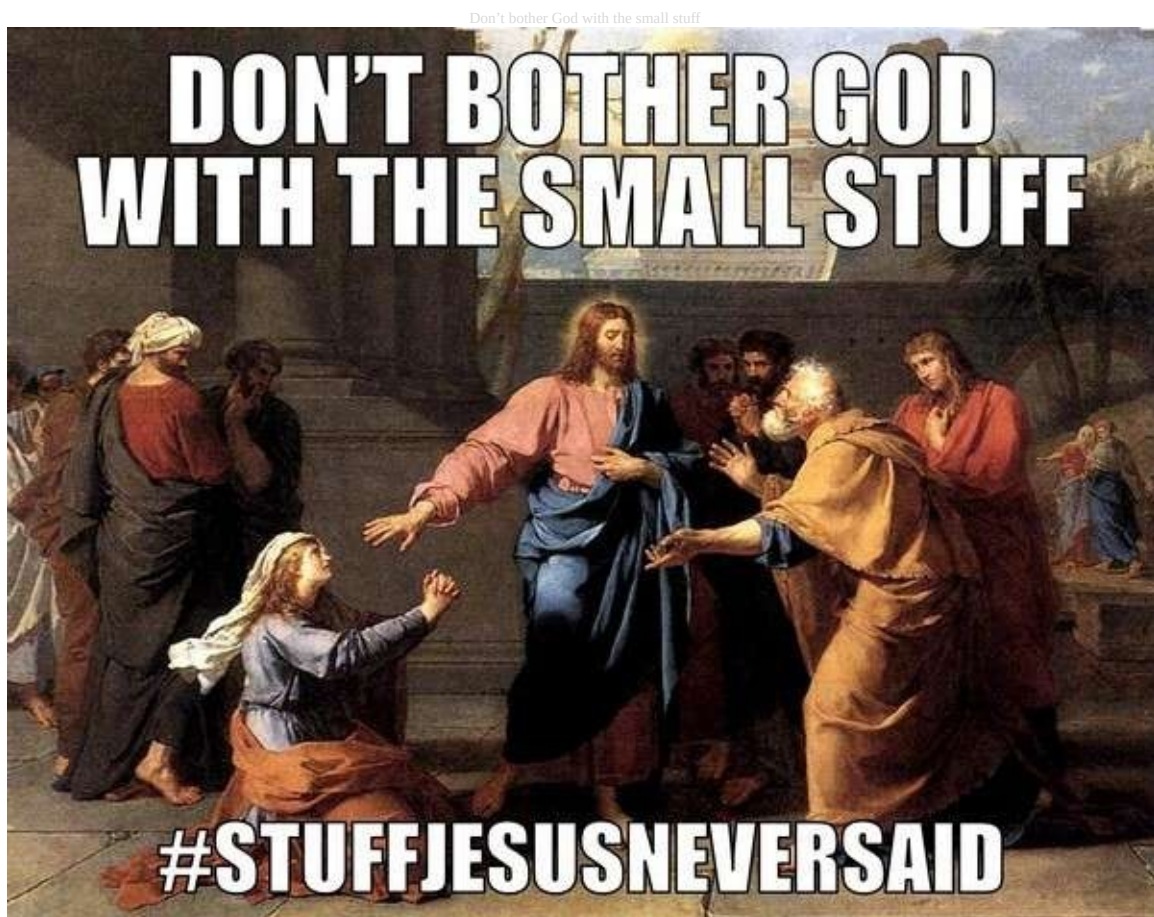

Such good news is hard to believe. "But your honor, you don't know what I've done. I've done some bad stuff."

And the court of heaven replies, "No, you don't know what Christ has done. He who knew no sin became sin so that you who were never righteous might become righteous." It's a divine exchange, his life for yours.

This is what grace looks like. Grace breaks the bonds of sin and removes the yoke of guilt. Grace lifts us from the clay and sets us on the rock. Grace draws our gaze heavenward and gives us wings to fly.

“So it's okay to pray?”

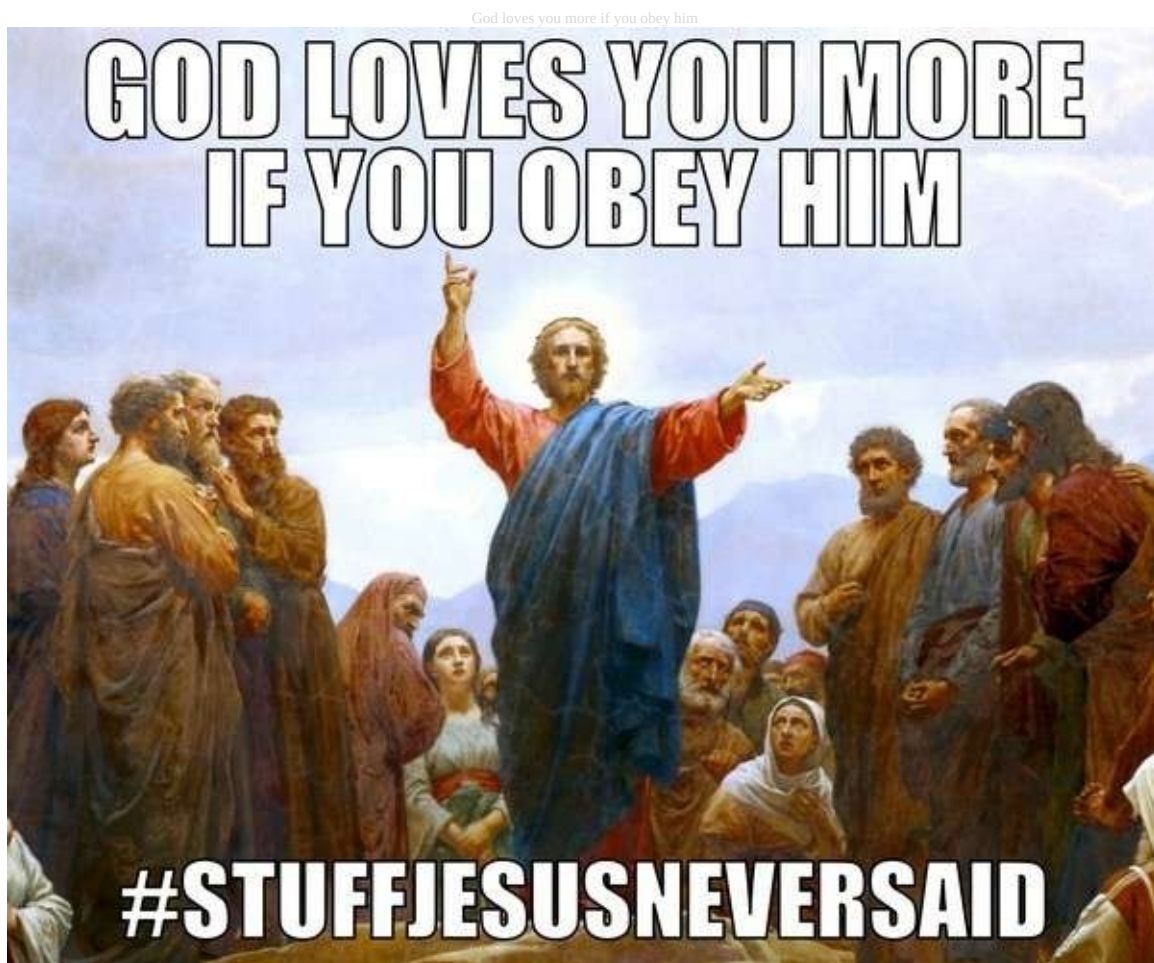
Prayer is the cure for worry. “Seek God first,” said Jesus, “and he will take care of you.”

What did we do when we first realized how much our Father loves us? Not much. We didn’t strive, we didn’t toil, and we didn’t bust our humps trying to please him. We just enjoyed him. We basked in his unconditional love and reveled in his grace.

“Do that,” says Jesus. “Don’t return to the wilderness of works, but make your home in the sunny place of his unmerited favor.”

A thief, a cast-off, and an adulterer. We don’t know if they ever prayed, but we do know that the cries of their hearts, whether spoken or unspoken, were heard by a God who cares.

JESUS TOOK OUR SICKNESS

Jesus never made anyone sick. Jesus will never make you sick.

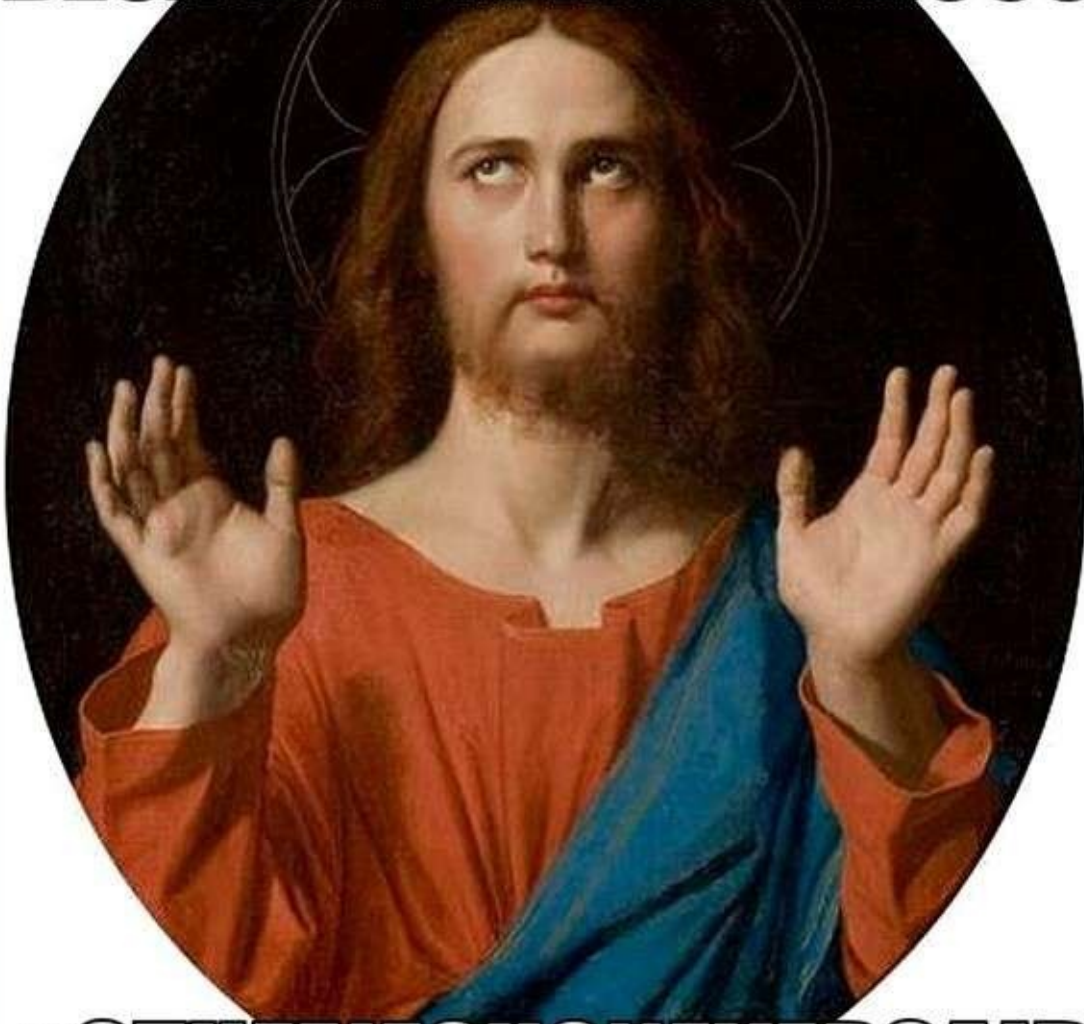
Jesus made sick people well. Jesus can make you well.

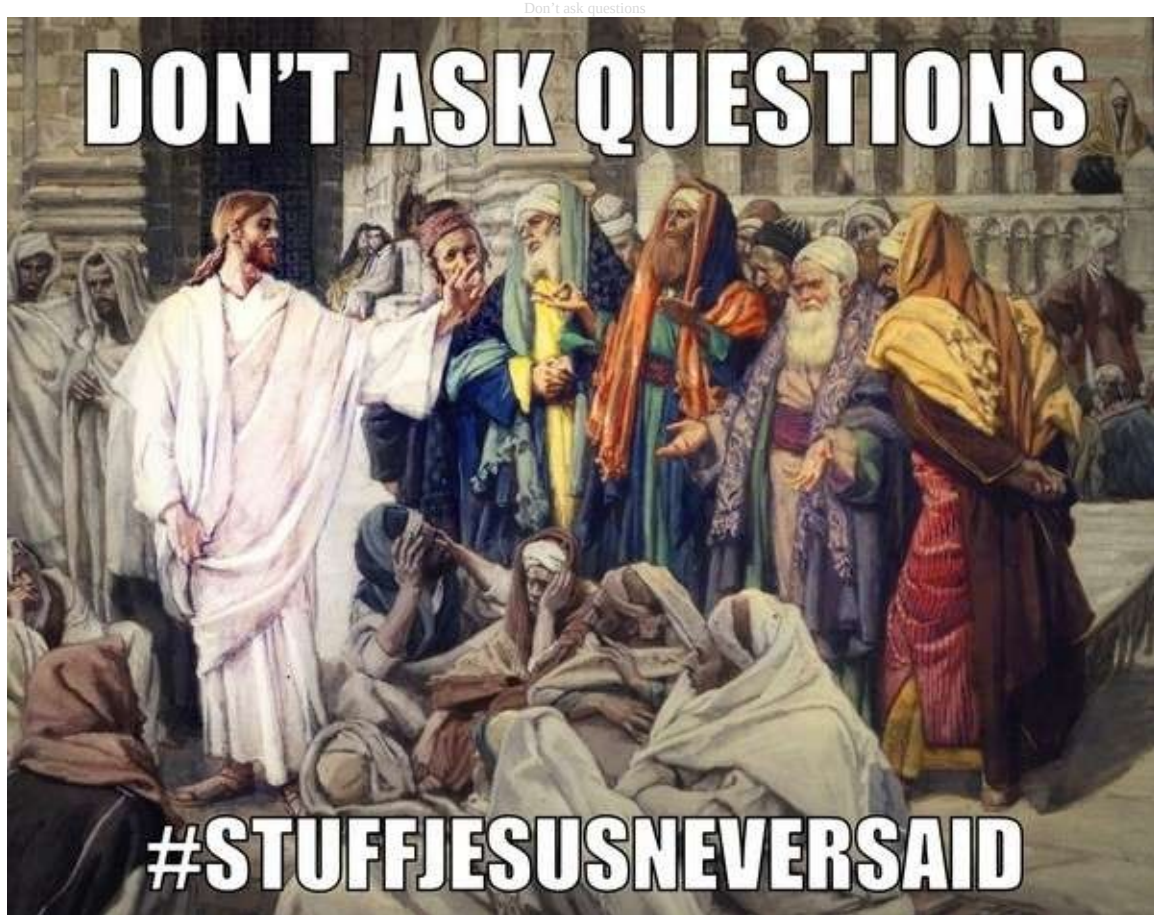
Excuses like these may bring shallow comfort, but they don't heal us. They reduce us to spectators on the sidelines of our own lives.

Nor did he cast about for excuses. "There must be some sin you haven't confessed. Maybe God's using your illness to teach you how to endure."

Nope. Jesus prayed a second time and the man was totally healed.

Haven't received your healing? Don't give up. Don't surrender to the prison of excuses. Don't be downcast and disappointed but fix your eyes on Jesus.

"Heal the sick." **Matthew 10:8**



ASK AND YOU SHALL RECEIVE

A famous preacher once said, “Christians, like slaves and soldiers, don’t ask questions.” In other words, do what you’re told and don’t make trouble. “How dare you question God?”

But Jesus said, “Ask and you shall receive.” Asking questions is healthy. It’s how we grow. When we stop asking, we stop growing.

Jesus said we come to his kingdom like little children. Children ask questions all the time: Why is the sky blue? Why do ladybugs have spots? Where do thoughts come from? Do sharks know they are evil? Why do we see only one thing if we have two eyes? What’s outside the universe? Why don’t fish have eyebrows?

A good father delights in the questions of his children, for he knows that good

questions are doors to discovery. They are keys that unlock treasure.

The problem is we don't ask so we don't receive. The door stays shut and the treasure stays locked.

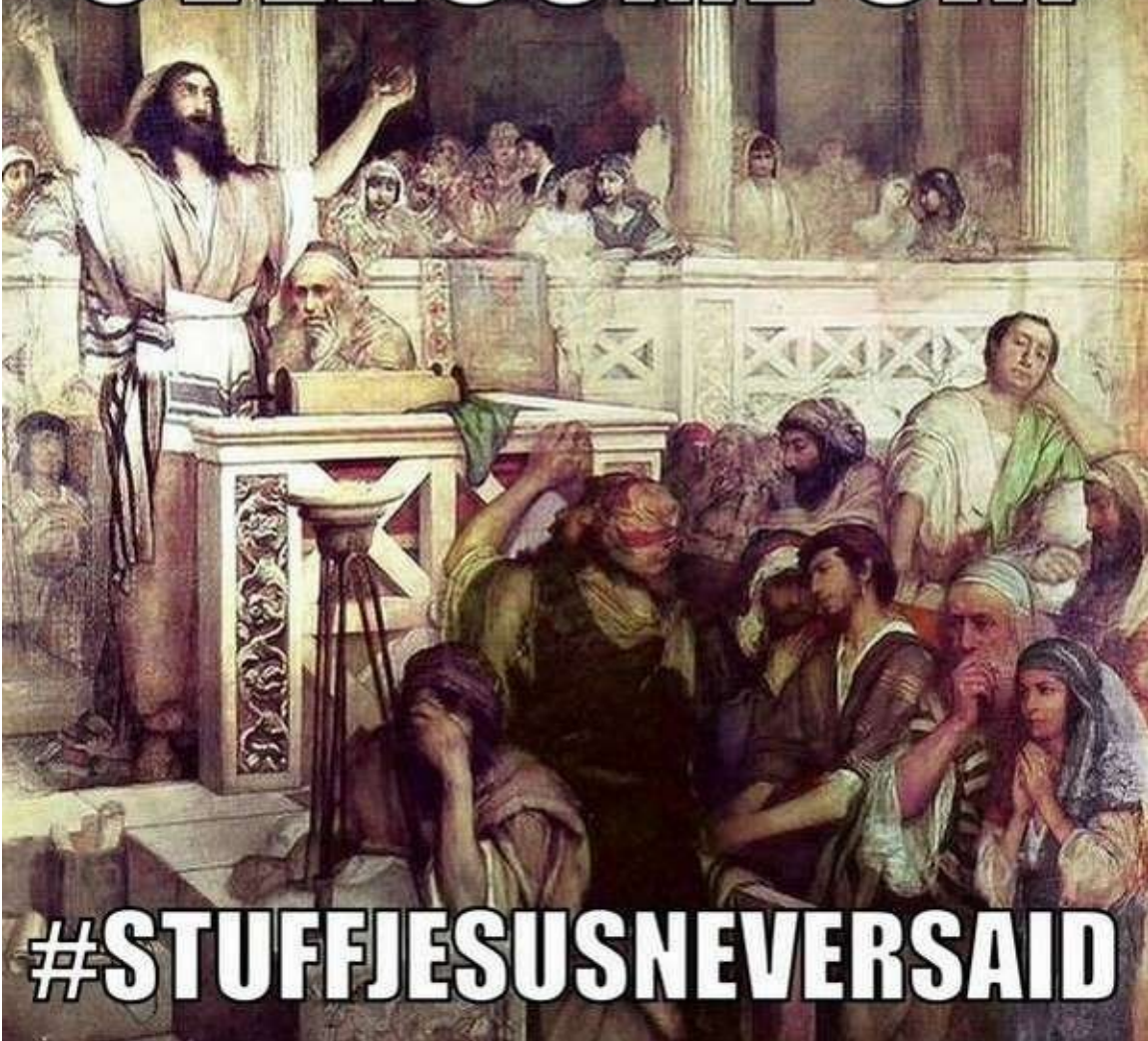

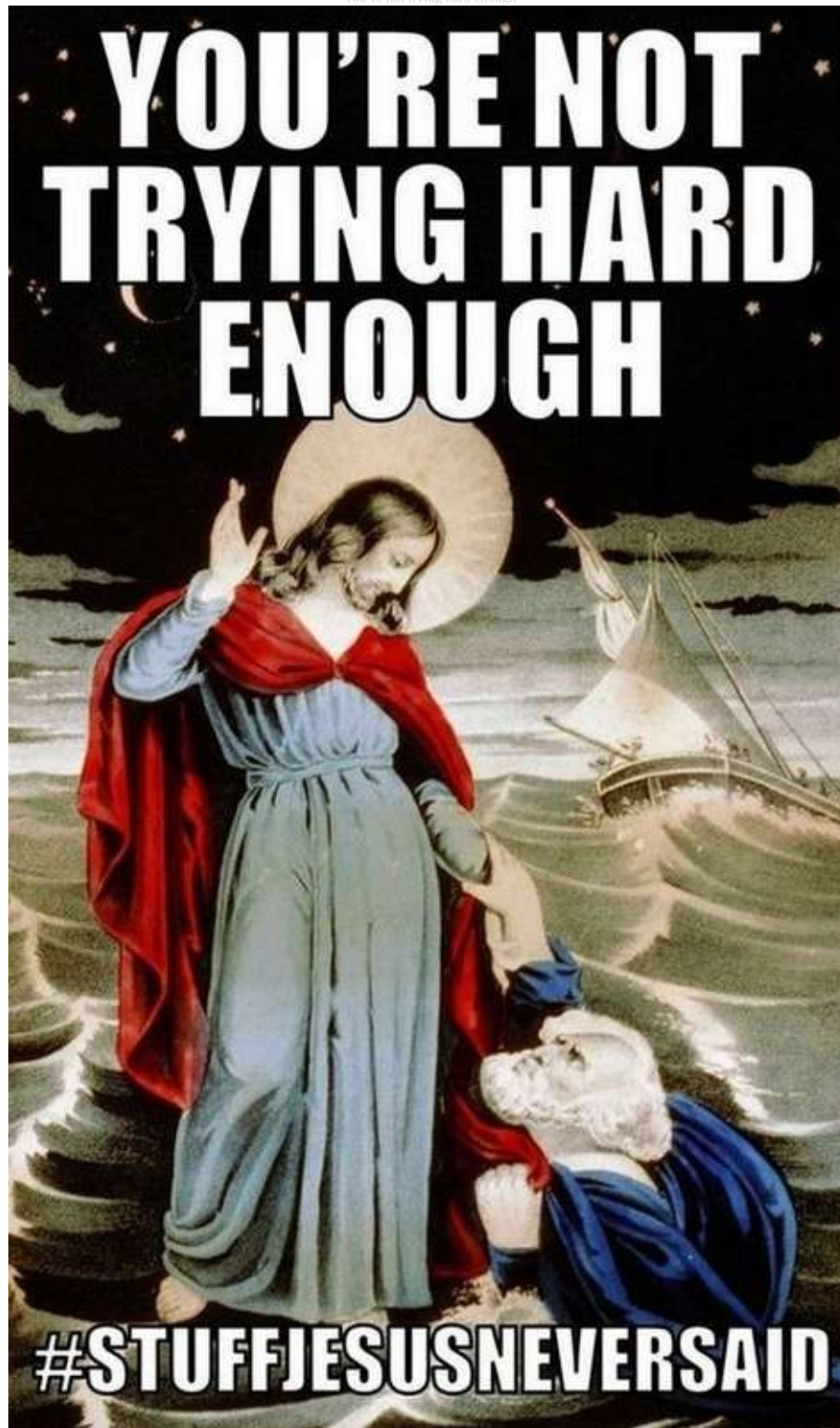
Jesus has done the heavy lifting and you don't need to press a thing.

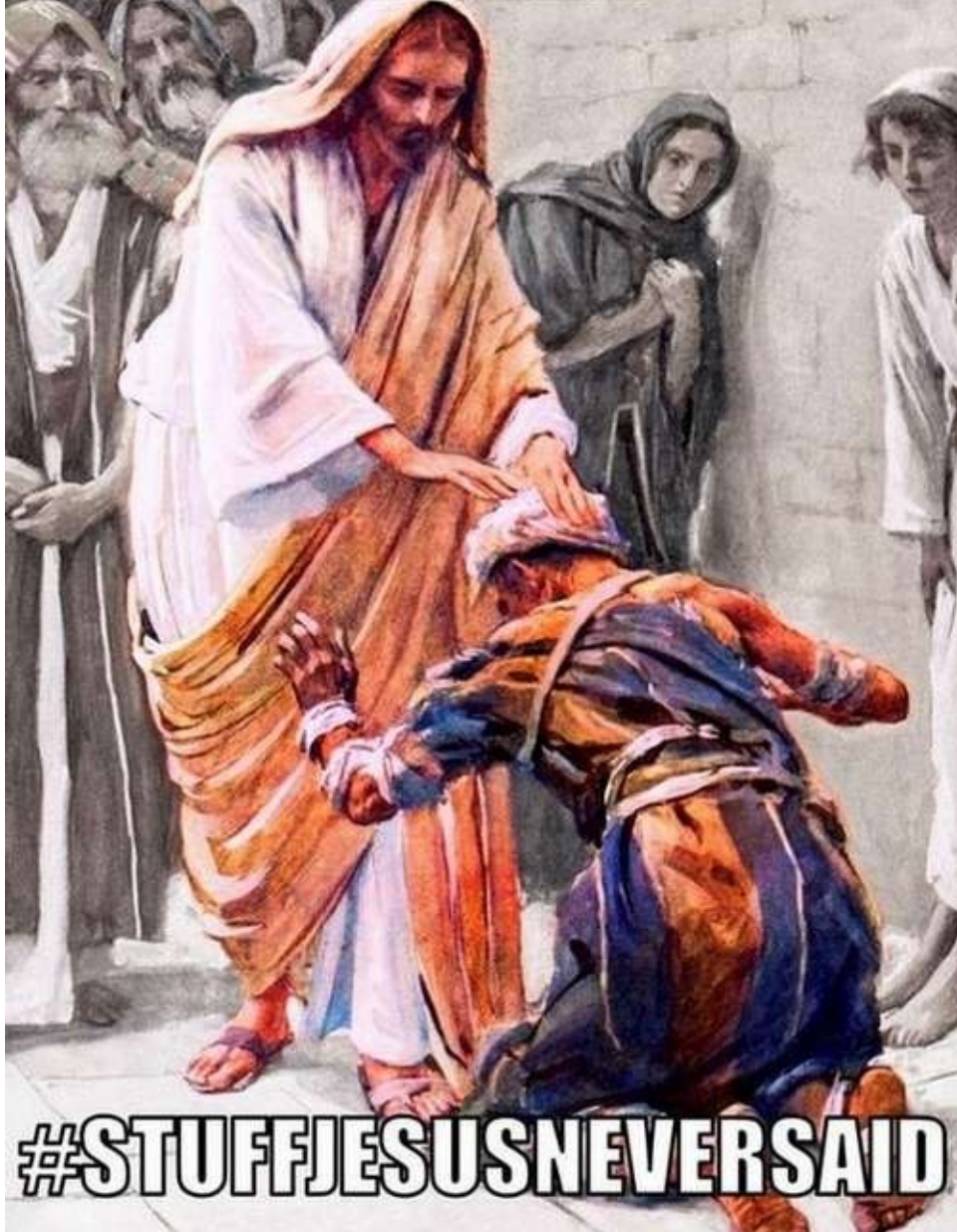
How do we bear his fruit in our lives? By not trying. By learning to rely on his love and trusting in the Father’s pruning.

In small amounts guilt is not a bad thing. Guilt signals a hurt that needs to be mended. “Oh no, I forgot your birthday.” “I feel bad because I lost my temper.” But in a world that worships performance, guilt has gotten out of control.

We feel guilty for things we did do and things we didn’t. We feel guilty when we’re early and when we’re late. We feel guilty when we fail and when we do well. (I could’ve done better.) No matter what we do, guilt never goes away. Like an alarm that won’t switch off, guilt is the soundtrack to our lives.

In Jesus’ day, the religious leaders tried to motivate people with guilt. In the name of a God they did not know, they burdened people with rules they couldn’t keep, then punished them when they failed to perform. “You’re a miserable sinner. You’re letting God down.”

Guilt may be the *lingua franca* of rule-based religion, but it wasn’t a language that Jesus spoke. In countless encounters with those judged “sinners” not once did he condemn, criticize, or point the finger of blame. He never sent anyone on a guilt trip.

On one occasion the religious leaders brought out a woman who had broken the rules. Her guilt was undeniable, unquestionable, irrefutable. Surely Jesus would have no choice but to agree with their guilty verdict. But he didn’t. He said, “I don’t condemn you.”

In this world there is no shortage of critics and stone-throwers. But Jesus sings a different tune. He speaks words of grace and forgiveness that heal and empower us to live well. Hear him.

“Everyone has sinned ... but by the free gift of God’s grace all are put right with him through Christ Jesus.” **Romans 3:23–24 (GNB)**



HE'S GOD YOUR FATHER, NOT THE GODFATHER

“God will bless you if you tithe, but curse you if you don’t.”

“Giving provides supernatural protection for your finances.”

“If you don’t tithe, you open the door to the devourer.”

Perhaps you have heard claims like these, but Jesus never said them. They’re lines from gangster movies. “Pay up or you could have an unfortunate accident.”

Jesus is not a mobster selling protection. He will never ask you for a bribe or

threaten to send you to the hospital.

“What about when Jesus told the healed man, ‘Stop sinning or something worse may happen to you’?” That was a life-giving warning as in, “Stop smoking or you may get lung cancer,” or, “Stop texting on the freeway lest you crash.”

Death is sin’s wage, not God’s gift. Sin kills; God gives life.

God wants to heal you, not make you ill. He desires to bless you, not curse you. And the good news that Jesus revealed is that God blesses us without regard to our giving. “He makes his sun to shine on good and bad people alike.”

God loves a cheerful giver, not a fearful giver. There’s no fear in love, and love makes no threats.

“The Lord longs to be gracious to you.” **Isaiah 30:18**

A mind burdened with sickness can lose perspective. You may think, "I'm going

to die,” even though you’re not. Or you may say, “This sickness is a blessing,” even though it isn’t.

Arthritis is not a blessing. Bulimia is not a blessing. Cancer is not a blessing. But if you believe your illness is a blessing, it can keep you from being blessed.

The Bible is full of stories about people who came to Jesus for healing. But did you ever wonder about the folks who stayed home? When Jesus passed by they didn’t yell to get his attention, like the blind beggar in Jericho. They didn’t push through the crowd or have their friends lower them through roofs.

Jesus healed all who came to him, but in Nazareth not many were healed. Why not? Not all came to him. Some held back. They had made peace with their illnesses. They dismissed Jesus as merely “Joseph’s son” and didn’t see him as their healer.

Jesus might have said, “Free healing. Come and get yours!” But they replied, “No, thanks. We’re good.”

Yet not all felt this way. Jesus laid his hands on a few sick people and they were healed. Which makes you wonder how things were after Jesus left.

“Did you see Larry got his leprosy taken away? He no longer sleeps outside the wall. He got his old job back at the mill, he’s courting the rabbi’s daughter and there’s talk of marriage.”

“Hey, good for Larry, but that’s not for me. I’ve got a good home out here in the Lepers’ Camp.”

“(Jesus) marveled because of their unbelief.” **Mark 6:6 (NKJV)**



GRACE IS A LICENSE TO SING

It's not hard to see why Zacchaeus had no friends. He was a money-grubbing bureaucrat who worked for the hated Romans. The Jews had no doubt that he was stealing from them to line his own pockets. Then one day, Jesus, the friend of sinners and money-grubbing bureaucrats, invited himself over for a meal.

After meeting Jesus, Zacchaeus became a more dangerous thief than ever. "I will take half of the possessions of the poor," he boasted, "and I will cheat everybody four times as much."

Actually, that's not what happened. That's not how grace works. But that's how some *think* grace works. They say, "If grace covers my sin, why can't I go on sinning? Why can't I sin more?"

When you encounter the grace that Jesus gives, continuing in sin makes no sense at all. It's preferring the pig pen to the banqueting table. It's choosing the prison cell over the palace.

After he met Jesus, Zacchaeus was radically changed. He stopping stealing and made amends for the damage he had done. Having received the friendship of Christ, Zacchaeus sought to give friendship to others.

The old tunes of loneliness were replaced by new songs of acceptance and love.

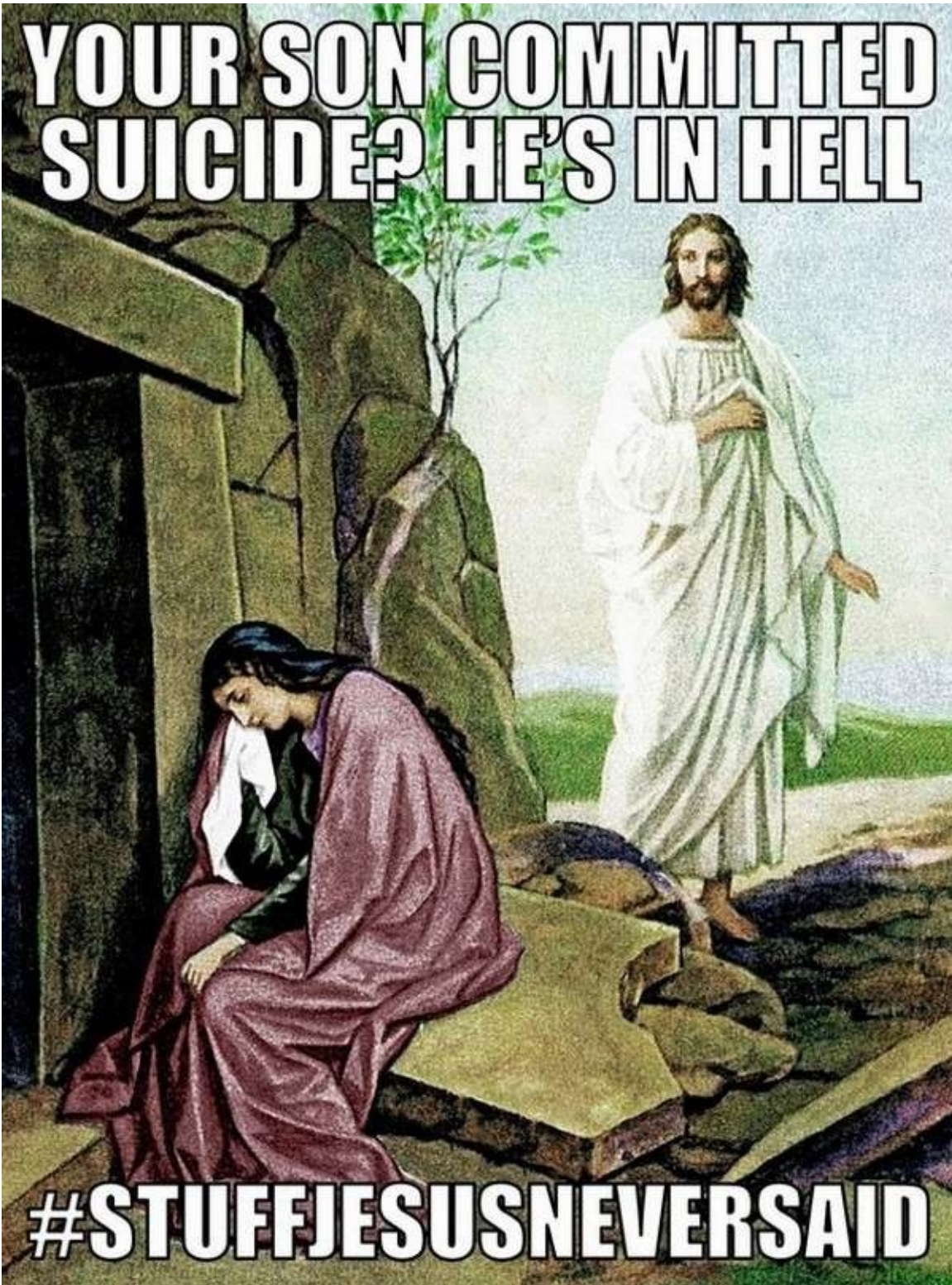
That's what grace does. Grace turns enemies into friends, thieves into givers, and haters into lovers. Grace empowers us to live well and sin no more.

JESUS IS THE LAST WORD

Suicide raises hard questions for which there are trite and wretched answers.

“Where is your son? He’s in hell for the sin of murder. Where is your daughter? She’s eternally lost because she died without repenting.”

Such comfortless answers are a million miles from the heart of a comforting king. Look at how Jesus spoke to two grieving sisters: “I am the resurrection and the life. He who believes in me will live, even though he dies.”

That’s a promise lacking in conditions. “He who believes will live.”

What if the believer dies from pneumonia? Irrelevant.

What if they are murdered? Immaterial.

What if they die at their own hand? Ditto.

The way in which you shrug off your mortal coil has no bearing on Christ’s promise of resurrection life. Whether you die from an overdose or go down with the Titanic, “He who believes in me will live.”

Why do some take their own lives? The reasons can seem incomprehensible to loved ones left behind. But while some may damn the departed or frown at those who failed to pick up the signals, Christ does not. There is no condemnation in Christ, in life or death. There is only love that leads to hope.

“For I am convinced that neither death nor life ... will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord.” **Romans 8:38–39**



GOD IS GOOD TO YOU

When our prayers seem to go unanswered, we might think, “There’s something wrong with me.” When life knocks us down, we might say, “I’m not good enough for God to bless me.”

It’s not true. There is nothing that would cause God to withhold his love from you. When did Jesus ever refuse to help someone who asked him?

Under the old law that Israel lived by, there were standards that had to be kept. You had to be well-behaved and untainted to enjoy the blessings of God. If you were a sinner, a leper, a woman, or a foreigner, you had little chance.

Then Jesus came and made a beeline for sinners, lepers, women, and foreigners.

The old law condemns you as not good enough, but the grace of God revealed in Jesus says, “I love you and I’m here to help.”

God doesn’t help you because you are good but because *he* is good. Just look at some of the people he helped in the Bible. There was David (a murderer), Gideon (a coward), Jacob (a conman), Rahab (a prostitute), and Saul (a hater).

Jesus is the friend of sinners, which means he’s the friend of the not good enough. He died for sinners, which means he died for the not good enough. He did all this that we might receive his goodness and see ourselves as our heavenly Father sees us; as more than good enough, indeed dearly beloved and pleasing to God.

“You are altogether beautiful ... there is no flaw in you.” **Song of Solomon 4:7**



LOVE NEVER DIES

When Jesus was baptized in the River Jordan, God the Father spoke from heaven. “This is my Son, whom I love; with him I am well pleased.” Jesus had not yet begun his ministry. He had not healed any sick people, nor trained any disciples. Yet God said, “I love him and am well pleased with him.”

God loves us for who we are and without regard for our résumé. His love is not

improved by the good things we do, nor is it diminished by the bad.

Perhaps you've heard that sinning will cause God to stop loving you. It can't happen. Your sin has more chance of extinguishing the sun than dimming your Father's love for you.

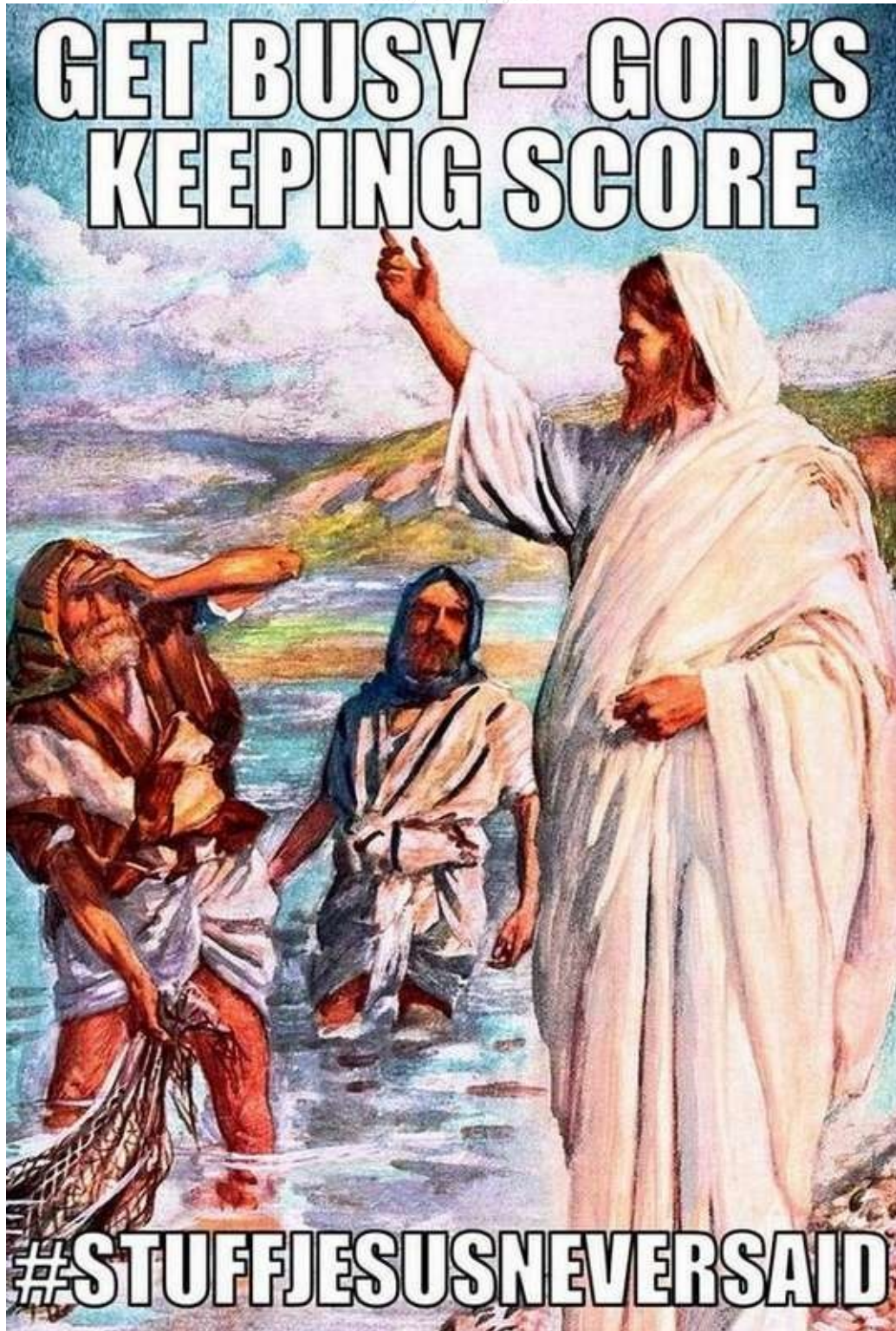
In the parable of the prodigal son, Jesus reveals a heavenly Father who loves us no matter what. In the story, the errant son wished his father dead, squandered his inheritance, and ruined his life. Yet the love of the father shone constantly from start to finish. The boy's sin did not diminish it one iota.

Jesus said, "As the Father loved me, I have loved you; abide in my love." The question we must ask is not, "Will God stop loving me?" but, "Will I abide in his love?"

To abide is to rest. It's remembering that the Father loves Jesus unconditionally, and that Jesus loves us the same way. It's living from the peace that nothing we do can make him love us any more or any less. Nothing at all.

"Love never gives up ... Love never dies." 1 Corinthians 13:4,8 (MSG)

Get busy—God's keeping score



LIFE IS A REST, NOT A TEST

Jesus once told a story about a lazy servant who was beaten by his master. “The servant who knows the master’s will and does not do what the master wants will be beaten with many blows.” When he finished, all the disciples jumped up and got busy.

Actually that last bit didn’t happen, but many act as though God is a harsh taskmaster who beats his servants. “Just look at the beating Jesus gave to Mary when she didn’t help her sister in the kitchen.”

Actually, that didn’t happen either. What did happen was Martha served the Lord while Mary received from the Lord, and Jesus commended Mary for making the better choice. Jesus came to serve, not be served.

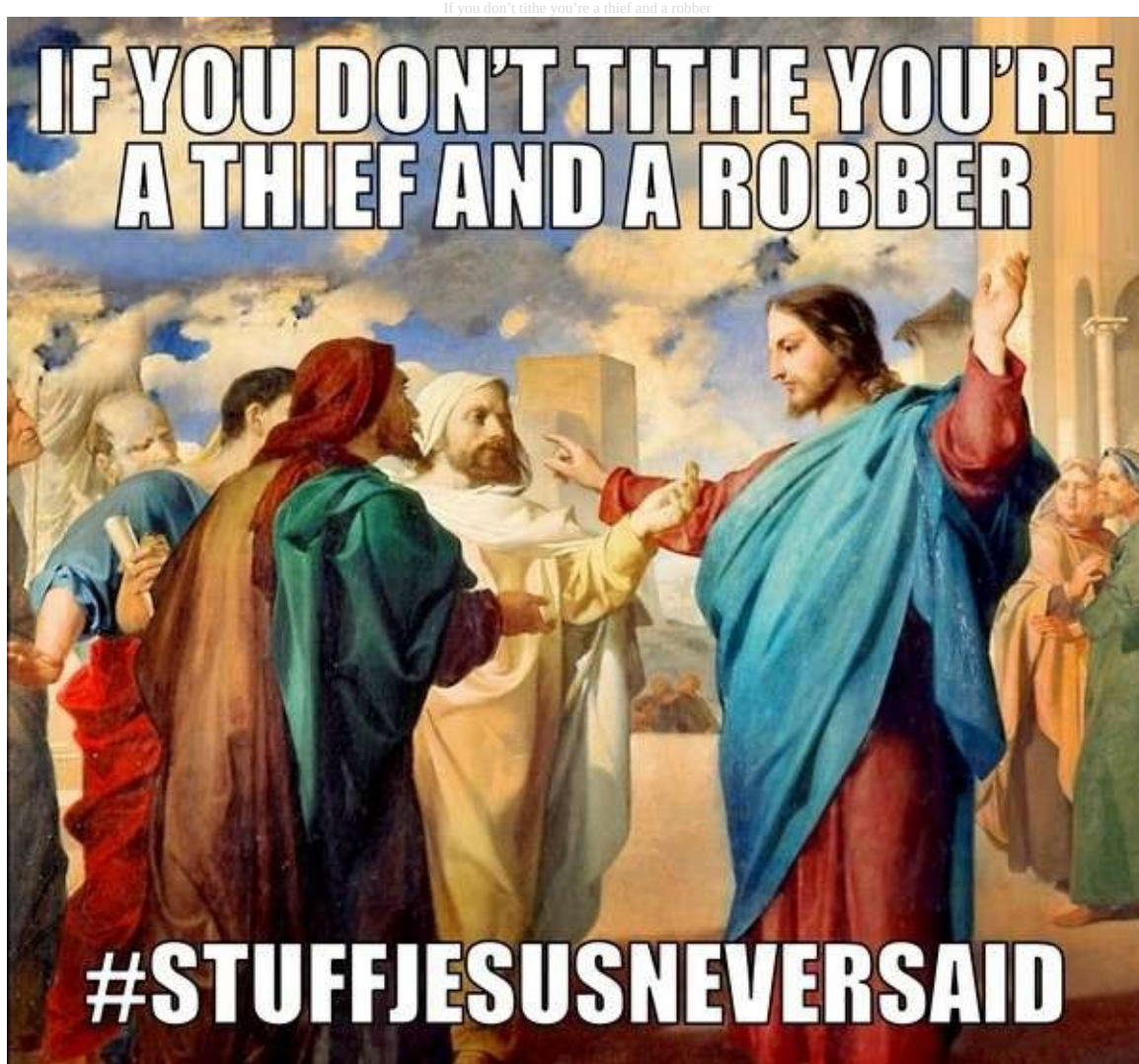
In this world success is all about keeping score. How much have you done? What have you accomplished? Did you pass the test? But when it comes to love there is no scorebook. You have nothing to prove because Christ took the test on your behalf and passed with flying colors.

“But won’t God beat us if we’re idle?” No, God is not a child-abuser. Your heavenly Father is not grading you on how hard you work.

“But Jesus said, ‘From everyone who has been given much, much will be demanded.’ That sounds like he expects payback.”

What is the much that is demanded? It is not your good behavior or your results, for these are nothing compared to what has been given. What God demands, God supplies. The much that will be demanded is the much that has been given, and that is Jesus himself. Nothing less than him will do.

“He gave us his Son—will he not also freely give us all things?” **Romans 8:32 (GNB)**



JESUS IS YOUR TITHE

Jesus poked the hornets' nest when he said, "Watch out for those law-lovers who strut about in long robes, pray long prayers, and take the best seats at banquets." It was a provocative statement because Jesus was standing in the temple courts when he said it. He was surrounded by long-robed men.

"These men devour widows' houses," added Jesus. No doubt some of the long-robed men were upset to hear this. Perhaps they got defensive. "I never devoured a widow's house."

“Follow me to the treasury,” said Jesus. There he and his followers sat down to watch people bringing their offerings. Right on cue, as if it had been pre-ordained, a poor widow dropped in two copper coins.

“Those two coins might not look like much,” said Jesus, “but that was her grocery money. She needed that to live, yet she gave it away. Now she has nothing left.”

Jesus was not praising the widow’s generosity as much as rebuking the rich who steal from the poor. The same practice continues today whenever religious threats are made. “If you don’t tithe you’re robbing God. If you don’t tithe you’ll be cursed. If you don’t tithe you’re going to hell.”

How does religion devour the poor? By threatening them in the name of God, so that in terror they give everything they have, right down to their last penny.

The law was the shadow, but Jesus is the reality.

Just as God doesn’t expect you to slaughter sheep at the altar, nor does he expect you to tithe your crops. Jesus is the Lamb of God, your sacrificial offering and tithe.

“These are a shadow of the things that were to come; the reality, however, is found in Christ.” **Colossians 2:17**



THE REMEDY FOR SIN

What is God's solution for sin? Is it earthquakes, tornadoes, and other natural disasters? A city is wiped out in a hurricane and someone says, "God was judging them for their sin." A town is flattened by an earthquake and apparently, "This was an act of divine punishment."

Except it wasn't.

It's true, we did have a sin problem, but God dealt with our problem 2000 years ago. The cross—not natural disasters—is God's once-for-all-time remedy for sin.

In the Bible a tower collapsed killing eighteen people. "Do you think that was

God's judgment?" asked Jesus. "Do you think he knocked down that tower because of their sin? Do you think they were worse sinners than others living in Jerusalem? No. That's not what God does."

If we were punished every time we sinned, we'd have very short lives.

God doesn't want us to reap the destructive consequences of sin. He wants us to live. So he sends Jesus and the mountain of our sin falls on him instead of us. Then Jesus gets up from the grave to show us that he is greater than the mountain and that the mountain is no longer the problem.

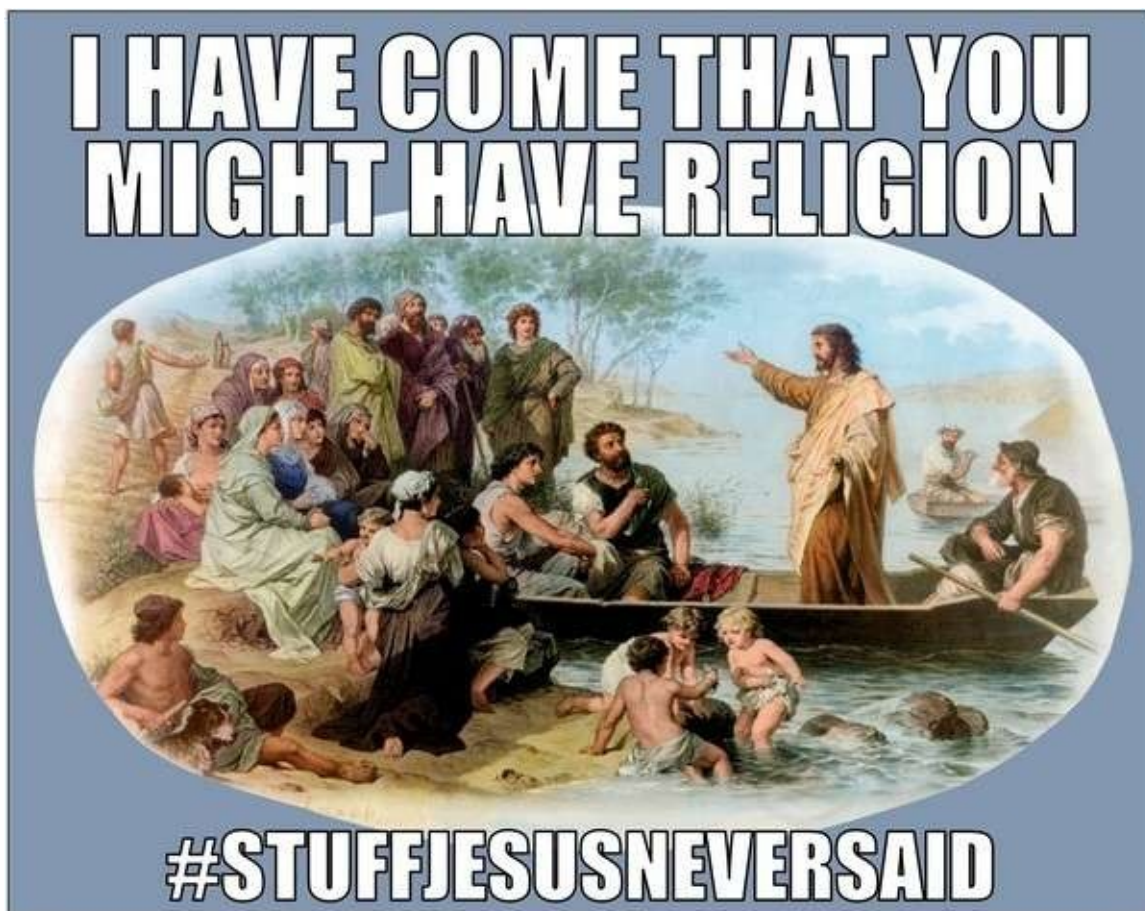
When Jesus rose from the dead it was as though God was shouting, "My love for you is greater than your sin. Believe it!"

Jesus didn't suffer and die to establish a new religion. Jesus is the end of religion.

The old was marked by terrifying threats: "Whoever has sinned against me I will blot out of my Book." But the new is marked by wonderful promises: "He who overcomes will be clothed in white, and I will never blot out his name from the Book of Life."

These words are Christ's guarantee of salvation. His promises are rocks you can stand on.

"But what if I don't overcome? What if I fall at the last hurdle?"

Remember, it's not about you, but Jesus who said, "I have overcome the world."

The devil couldn't tempt him, the religious couldn't silence him, Pilate couldn't fault him, death couldn't keep him, and the grave couldn't hold him. You have a great need for overcoming; you have a great Overcomer for your need.

God does not make mistakes. When your name goes in his Book, it stays in there forever.

Preaching grace without law is unbalanced

YOU CAN TRY OR YOU CAN TRUST

You can relate to God through grace or law. Watchman Nee, the Chinese teacher

and author, distinguished the two like this: “Grace means that God does something for me; law means that I do something for God.”

This difference is captured in the story Jesus told about the Pharisee and the tax collector. Both men went to the temple to pray. The Pharisee boasted of all he was doing for the Lord, but the tax collector stood at a distance, beat his chest and said, “God, have mercy on me, a sinner.”

The first man took pride in his lawful performance, but Jesus was not impressed. “Everyone who exalts themselves will be humbled.” The second man had nothing to boast about, yet Jesus said he went home right with God. “Those who humble themselves will be exalted.”

That’s the difference between law and grace. The law silences the proud, while grace elevates the humble. The law condemns the best of us, but grace justifies the worst of us.

Law and grace cannot be mixed. It’s one or the other. The law is a hard taskmaster, but Jesus said, “My burden is easy.” To live by the rules is to bear a heavy yoke, but Jesus said, “My yoke is light.”

There is no middle ground, no grace plus law. You can try to keep the law or you can trust in Christ who fulfilled the law on your behalf.

To paraphrase Watchman Nee, you can try or you can trust, and the difference between the two is heaven and hell.

“Walk with me and ... learn the unforced rhythms of grace. I won’t lay anything heavy or ill-fitting on you.” **Matthew 11:29 (MSG)**

GIVING IN SECRET

“Before I begin the Sermon on the Mount,” said Jesus never, “I want to publicly acknowledge some important donors. Then I’ll name and shame those of you who haven’t given a bean.”

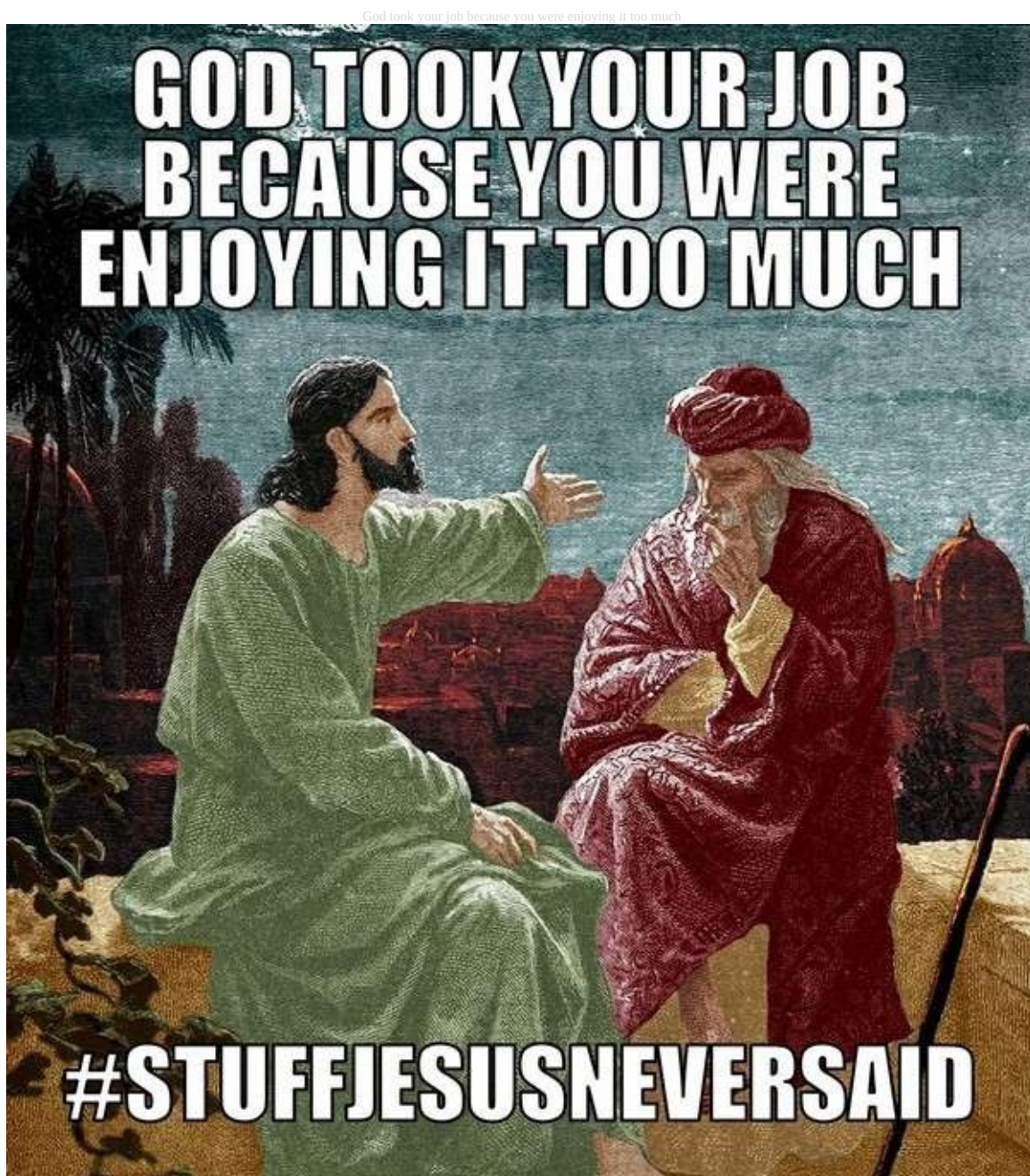
Jesus never used shame or told sob stories to pressure people into giving. Nor did Jesus ever say to the disciples, “When building your churches, large tithers are key. Make sure you land those whales.”

Jesus never said anything like that.

But he did say something like this: “When you give to the needy, don’t flash your wallet around like the hypocrites do. Instead, give in secret. Don’t let your left hand know what your right hand is giving. Then your Father, who sees what is done in secret, will reward you.”

The practice of acknowledging people according to how much they give promotes pride, “Look at how much you gave!” and shame, “You’ve not given enough.” Temples and tabernacles have been built with both, but God’s kingdom is funded by neither.

“Make up your own mind what you will give. That will protect you against sob stories and arm-twisting.” **2 Corinthians 9:7 (MSG)**



GOD DOESN'T TAKE AWAY HIS GOOD GIFTS

Joy and happiness followed Jesus wherever he went. In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus listed eight ways to be blessed or happy. He told stories about the joy of finding lost things and buried treasures. He brought joy to cripples, the blind, and the parents of dead children. And when he ascended into heaven, his

disciples were filled with great joy.

Yet apparently God is a killjoy who wants you to serve him in misery and sadness.

Such is the picture we get from joyless religion. “You need to be serious, work hard, and suck lemons.” In other words, if you’re enjoying life, you must be doing something wrong.

How different is the God of the Bible! The Psalmist said of the Lord, “At your right hand are pleasures forevermore.” James the Apostle wrote, “Every good and perfect gift comes down from the Father of lights.”

As light comes from the sun, good things come from God. He is the Source of all that is good and lovely.

“God does not change like shifting shadows,” added James. In other words, God doesn’t change his mind and take back his good gifts.

Good health, a good marriage, good friends, good food, and a good job—these are good gifts that point to a good God who delights to bless us and who never takes back what he gives.

“I will sing the Lord’s praise, for he has been good to me.” **Psalm 13:6**



GOD IS NOT A FAULT FINDER

A traveler was lost in an unfamiliar city. As night fell and curtains were drawn, he began to lose all hope of finding his way. Then an officer of the law passed by.

"Excuse me, sir," said the traveler, "I'm lost."

"Indeed you are," said the law-man, "for you are in a dangerous neighborhood. You have foolishly taken a wrong turn. Retrace your steps and take a better one."

Then turning on his heels, the constable strode off into the night leaving the traveler as lost as ever.

Perhaps you have heard it said that the Holy Spirit reminds us of our sins. "When you sin, he will point out your fault so that you can make amends." In

other words, he's the critical constable who tells you that you are lost, but does nothing to help you find your way.

But that is not how Jesus described the Holy Spirit. "The Holy Spirit will guide you into all truth."

The Spirit of Grace doesn't point to your faults; he points you to Jesus. He doesn't condemn you as lost; he shows you how to be found.

The hungry visitors were confused and bewildered by the owner’s behavior. Some laughed, some posted angry reviews, but none of them ever went back to the restaurant.

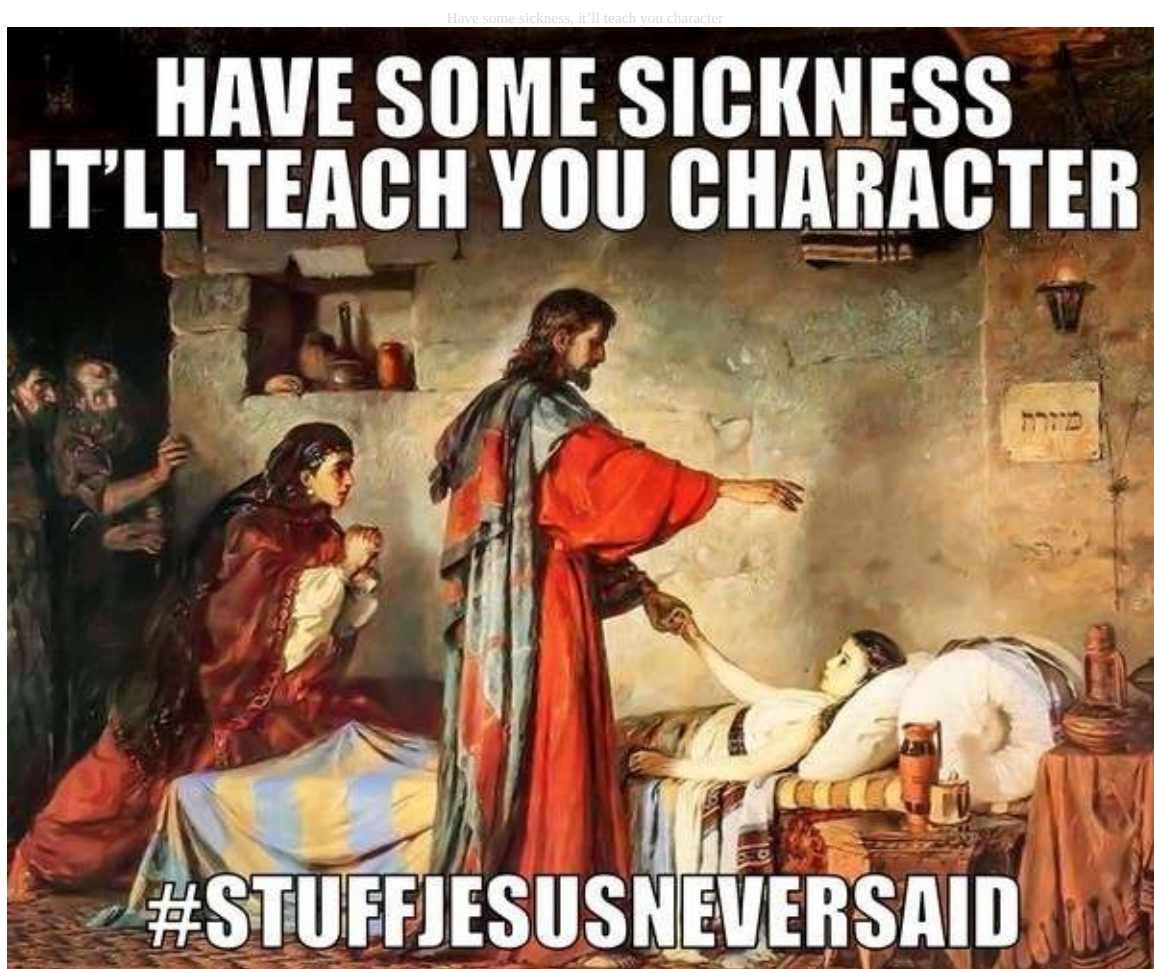
Who can partake of communion? Jesus specified no limits, but we do whenever we say things like: “If you’re not a church member, or if you’ve not been baptized, or if you’ve sinned, please don’t partake of the Lord’s table.” Like confused restaurateurs, we let people in, but we don’t let them eat.

Jesus ate with anyone, anywhere, anytime, but we have higher standards. Tax collectors? Forget about it. Prostitutes? Not a chance.

It seems the Lord was more generous with his table than we are. At the Last Supper Jesus served communion to men who, hours later, tried to kill other men with swords. Jesus even served communion to a man who was conspiring to kill him, a man Jesus had called a devil. It’s as if Jesus would serve communion to anyone.

Communion is good news in a cup. Who is communion for? It’s for everyone and anyone who needs to hear the good news.

“This cup is the new covenant in my blood, which is poured out for you.” **Luke 22:20**



JESUS OUR TEACHER

In the Bible people referred to Jesus as a teacher sent from God. Jesus is both the Great Physician and the Great Teacher. Yet apparently there are some things the Great Teacher can't teach.

Imagine the following conversation:

God: "I want Joe to learn humility. Jesus, can you teach humility?"

Jesus: "Humility, that's a toughie. Never been my strong suit, I'm afraid."

God: "No problem. Cancer's a good teacher. I'll give Joe pancreatic cancer, that'll teach him. Then one day he'll thank me for making him humble."

It's a ludicrous conversation, but it's no more ludicrous than attributing bad things to a good God.

Jesus spent three years teaching his disciples and not once did he say, "Peter, you hothead, have some paralysis, it'll teach you patience. James and John, you Sons of Thunder, you need to calm down, receive some tuberculosis. Thomas, you need more faith, have some scurvy."

It's ridiculous to think that God gives us sickness. God cannot give what he does not have.

"Great multitudes followed him, and he healed them all." **Matthew 12:15 (NKJV)**



“I GIVE YOU A KINGDOM”

Poverty is not a blessing. There is nothing good or blessed about being unable to feed, clothe, or house your family. So why would God want us poor? He doesn't. It's a myth. No father wants his kids to be poor and sick.

So why did Jesus say, “Blessed are the poor”? The poor are not blessed because they are poor. They're blessed because God gives them his kingdom.

And who are the poor? From God's perspective we are all poor and needy. Every single one of us needs the life that Christ offers.

God doesn't want you poor; he wants you blessed.

Think of the poor prodigal being clothed by his father. That's what God does to us. He puts shoes on our feet, his ring on our finger, and invites us to join the never-ending banquet of his delight.

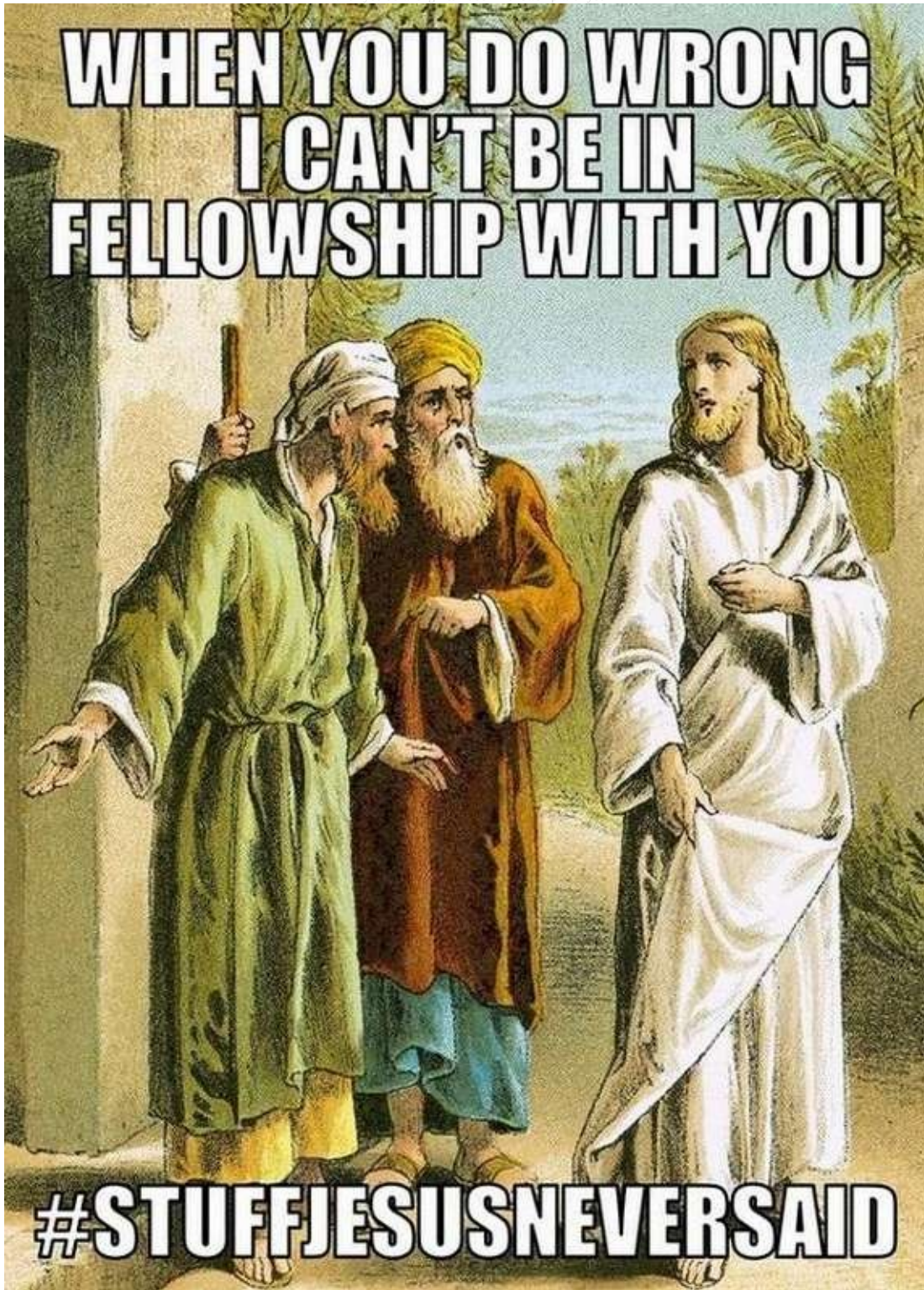
"I confer on you a kingdom," said Jesus to the disciples. The kingdom of God is not populated by poor princes. We are co-heirs with Christ who is the heir of all things.

A poverty mentality is a natural consequence of living in a world of never enough, but the grace Jesus revealed points to a God of more than enough. In this world there is lack, but there's no poverty in heaven. If poverty is not God's will there, it is not his will here.

JESUS WILL NEVER GIVE UP ON YOU

Does God get offended when we sin? Does he withdraw from us until we admit our fault? Did Jesus withdraw from his disciples after they abandoned him in the garden?

Jesus considers his brothers and sisters as members of his body. He can no more abandon us than he can abandon his own arm. When we sin, Jesus does not cut us off. When we are unfaithful, he remains faithful. His love never quits.

In his first letter to the Corinthians Paul asked, “Shall I take the members of Christ and unite them with a prostitute?” That such a thing is even possible testifies to the enduring strength of Christ’s love for you. It’s as if Christ were saying, “I hope you don’t sin, but if you do, I will never leave you nor forsake you.”

In a culture that worships rules, people are kept in line with fear. “Sin and God will cut you off.” But those who have met Jesus are motivated by a love that says, “Even if you sin I will never cut you off.” This is what changes us; not the weak restraint of rules, but the compelling power of his love.

Humanity was born to be free. Bind us with rules and we will chafe and run. But we gladly yield to unconditional love. It’s what we were made for.

On that resurrection night when the disciples saw the Lord, they did not find him hurt and offended. They didn’t hear him say, “Where were you turkeys?” Instead, they found a love that had conquered all and they were changed. The same men who ran in fear became globe-trotting apostles testifying to the love of Christ, a love that never gives up.

“If we give up on him, he does not give up—for there’s no way he can be false to himself.” **2 Timothy 2:13 (MSG)**



THE TREMBLING HAND OF FAITH

“To move your mountain-sized problem,” said Jesus, “A tiny grain of faith is sufficient.” The disciples wondered, “How is this possible? Surely big jobs require big faith.”

It’s not the size of your faith that matters, but the size of your God. The disciples didn’t need more faith. They needed to see the big God that Jesus reveals. “The things which are impossible with men are possible with God.”

Charles Spurgeon once said, “By faith all things become possible to us; yet the power is not in the faith, but in that God upon whom the faith relies.”

God’s powerful grace is experienced through faith.

If grace is the power station, then faith is the slender wire through which the current flows.

If grace is the tractor, then faith is the chain by which we are connected to that propelling power.

If grace is the river, then faith is the aqueduct by which we receive that flood of mercy.

“The weakness of your faith will not destroy you,” said Spurgeon. “(Even) a trembling hand may receive a golden gift.”

“If you have faith as small as a mustard seed, you can say to this mountain, ‘Move from here to there,’ and it will move.” **Matthew 17:20**



BY HIS STRIPES YOU ARE HEALED

“You want God to heal you? Then show him you mean business by fasting for days and praying for months.”

Perhaps you think you need to earn your healing. If you don't do your part, God can't do his part.

Or perhaps you've wondered, "Why wasn't Sam healed? Maybe he didn't pray hard enough. He wasn't desperate enough. He should've fasted."

Yet Jesus never spoke like this.

Jesus healed people who had prayed for years and people who had never prayed at all. He healed Jews and Gentiles, saints and sinners. He healed the high-born and the lowly, the living and the dead.

Jesus was indiscriminate to show that it's not about us or who we are or what we do. Healing is a God thing, from start to finish.

When you pray, don't focus on what you've done (I've fasted!) or not done (I haven't fasted!). Think about Jesus and what he's done.

"He was wounded for our transgressions ... and by his stripes we are healed."

Isaiah 53:5 (NKJV)



LOVE THAT HEALS

Life is messy. Try and reduce life to a set of neat rules and you'll end up tangled in knots. You'll be susceptible to nonsensical prescriptions such as this: "You're living in sin. Leave your current husband, who loves you, and return to your first, who is abusive and violent." It's a ludicrous suggestion, but one that divorced churchgoers sometimes hear.

This crazy cake is baked from three stock ingredients: First, "Divorce is a sin." So what does that say about God who divorced faithless Israel? Second, "God hates divorce." But he doesn't hate divorced people. He loves them. Third, "You broke it, you fix it." That sort of thinking led Adam to the fig leaves and a fat lot of good that did. Adam could not repair the damage of his mistake, and sometimes neither can we.

Divorce is not part of God's plan. God hates divorce because it hurts his kids, but divorce happens. Marriages sometimes break and families get torn apart. It's a tragedy that is only worsened by finger-pointing rule-worshippers.

The billy club of religious principles is no cure for brokenness.

What does Jesus say to the wife who's been dumped? "I love you, I always have and I always will." And what does Jesus say to the husband who dumped her? "I love you, I always have and I always will."

There, in the unconditional love of Christ, lies our healing. His acceptance for our rejection, and his balm for our wounds.

"He heals the brokenhearted and binds up their wounds." **Psalm 147:3**

Leave the church and we'll shun you



THE GOOD SHEPHERD WILL NEVER FORSAKE YOU

The list of people who walked away from Jesus is long, but the list of people Jesus shunned has no names.

Those who quit on Jesus were not cursed or mocked from the pulpit. Jesus did not say to them, "You have walked out from my umbrella of protection," or,

“You have a spirit of witchcraft.” Jesus didn’t stop loving people who stopped loving him.

Consider the disciples. On the night Christ was betrayed, they all ran away. They were the world’s first church and every one of them left.

Yet Jesus did not get angry or rebuke them. After rising from the dead he didn’t avoid them in the street or spread malicious rumors about them. Instead, he sought out the men who deserted him and said, “Peace be with you.”

From time to time sheep may run away, but the Good Shepherd never abandons his sheep. Instead he searches for them and he rejoices when he finds them.

“My sheep listen to my voice; I know them ... no one will snatch them out of my hand.” **John 10:27–28**



GOD DOESN'T NEED PERMISSION TO FORGIVE YOU

Jesus went around forgiving people who neither asked for forgiveness nor deserved it. A paralyzed man was brought to him and Jesus said, “Your sins are forgiven.” (Who said anything about forgiveness? I thought this was going to be

a healing meeting.)

An adulteress was brought to Jesus, and he said, “There’s no condemnation here.” (No condemnation? What am I going to do with these stones?)

Roman soldiers tortured him and nailed him to a cross, and Jesus said, “Father, forgive them.” (More forgiveness?! Where’s the wrath? Where’s the fire from heaven?)

Jesus forgave people who neither asked for nor deserved it to convey a powerful truth: God does not need your permission to forgive you. And God certainly doesn’t need your confession.

Perhaps you think you must review your sins and keep short accounts before God will forgive you. It’s not true. Did the paralyzed man confess? Did the soldiers?

Confession is not the price you pay for a gift that cannot be bought. But confession may help you receive the gift that has been given.

Genuine confession has less to do with me and my badness, and more to do with Christ and his goodness. It’s acknowledging my dependence on his grace. It’s agreeing with God that even though I messed up, his grace is greater than my sin, and his best is better than my worst.

True confession is saying, “Thank you, Jesus.”

“Friend, your sins are forgiven.” **Luke 5:20**

THE JOY OF GIVING

Are you conscious of some debt to Christ? Do you feel obliged to give? Do you give until it hurts?

To be obliged is to be bound to do something, so giving because you feel obligated is a form of bondage. Giving out of obligation is not giving; it's paying down a debt.

The notion that we have a debt to Christ, or that we could even begin to pay it insults the Spirit of grace. Christ died to set you free, not bind you with a debt you could never repay.

So why give? For what reason should we give anything?

Jesus gave his life for the joy set before him, meaning he did it for his family—his Father and all his brothers and sisters. Jesus didn't give because he was obliged to or because he had a debt to humanity. He did it because he loves you, and we give for the same reason—out of love for others.

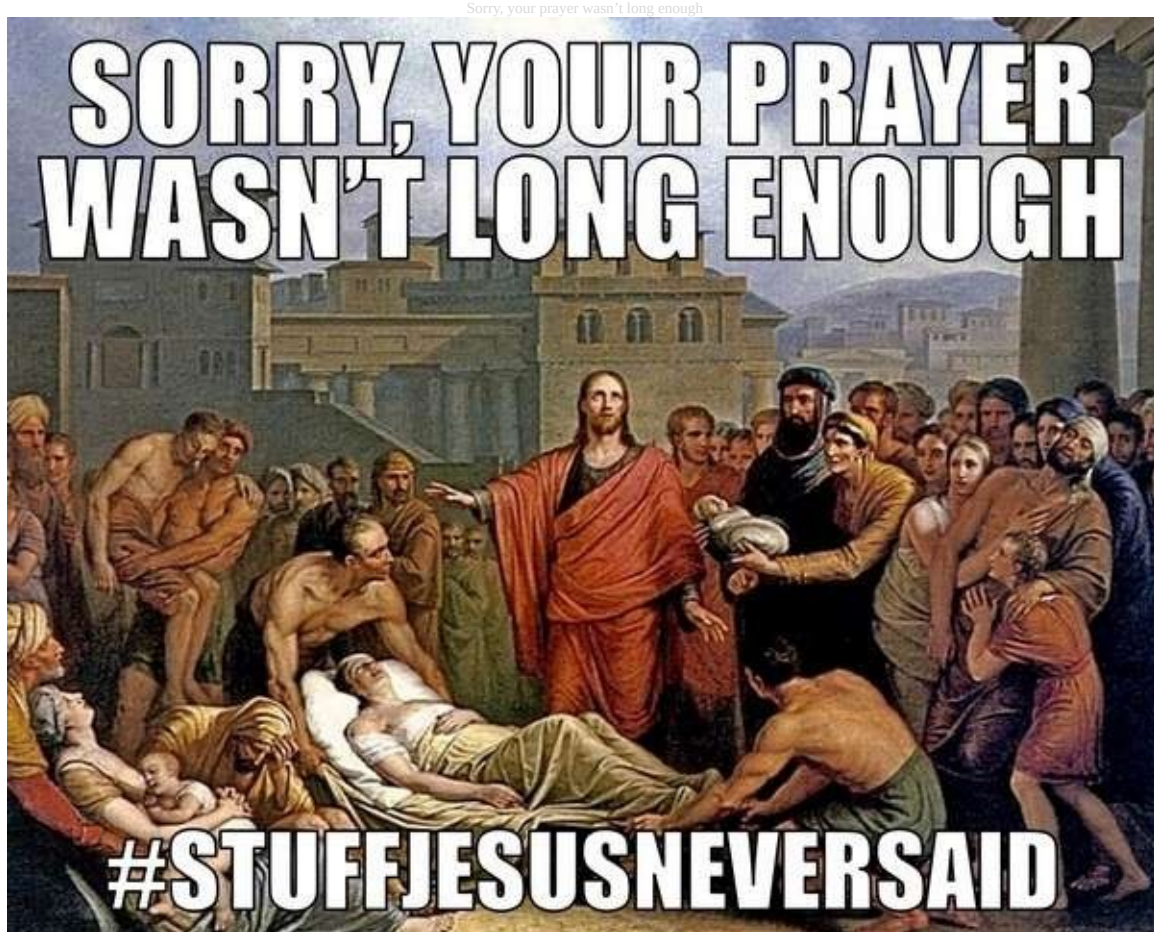
“Make friends for yourselves by unrighteous mammon,” said Jesus, “so that when you fail, they may receive you into an everlasting home.” In other words, spend your money on people so that when you die you'll have eternal friends.

How do we do that?

“Throw parties for the poor and weak,” said Jesus. “Invite people who can't pay you back. Give to the needy and you will have treasure in heaven that never wears out and no thief can steal.”

Jesus reveals that the joy in giving is experienced in the lives we touch, and the fruit of our giving can be enjoyed for eternity.

“God loves it when the giver delights in the giving.” **2 Corinthians 9:7 (MSG)**



YOUR FATHER HEARS YOU

Have you ever noticed the many short prayers recorded in the Gospels?

The thief on the cross prayed, "Lord Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." The tax collector in the temple prayed, "God be merciful to me a sinner." And drowning Peter prayed one of the shortest prayers of all, "Lord, save me."

When faced with a great need, the temptation is to pray hard, as though God needs to be convinced of our need. But Jesus said, "Your Father knows what you need before you ask him."

"But to show God I'm serious, I need to pray for hours and hours." "Not so,"

said Jesus. “Don’t babble on like pagans who think they will be heard because of their many words. Instead, pray like this: ‘Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name’.”

We don’t stand at a distance praying to Almighty God the Judge of the Living and the Dead. We draw close to our heavenly Father who loves us and wants to be revealed as our Daddy who knows our needs.

When the sick and oppressed came to him for healing, Jesus never told them to go away and pray more. And Jesus often kept his own prayers short. He healed the sick and drove out demons, “... with a word.”

Jesus stilled the storm and raised the dead with short prayers because he trusted in a heavenly Father who hears us and longs to help us in our hour of need.

“Father, I thank you that you have heard me.” **John 11:41**



YOU ARE NOT ALONE

Man rejected his Maker but God did not reject us. He did not abandon humanity but sent his Son to rescue us from the prison of loneliness and despair.

With his rescue mission nearly complete, Jesus told the disciples, "I will not leave you as orphans." An orphan is a fatherless child. An orphan is alone. Jesus was saying you don't have to be alone. "My Father and I will come to you and make our home with you."

After they received the Holy Spirit, the disciples understood what Jesus had meant when he said, "I am in my Father, and you are in me, and I am in you." No longer alone, they had become walking, talking temples of the Holy Spirit.

God takes lonely people and adopts them into his family. Why does he do it? Because God wants his kids back. How does it happen? Jesus woos us then ones us to himself in spiritual union. One with the Lord we become brand new, saints not sinners, children not orphans.

Companionship, friendship, intimacy—these are things we all long for, but Christ meets our need. We don't have to beg God to rend the heavens and come down. He already did. Neither do we fear that he might abandon us as orphans. He promised he wouldn't.

One with the Lord, we have strength for today and bright hope for tomorrow.

“God sets the lonely in families.” **Psalm 68:6**

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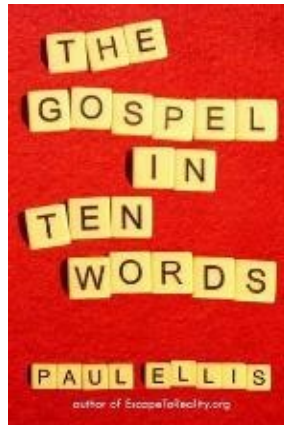
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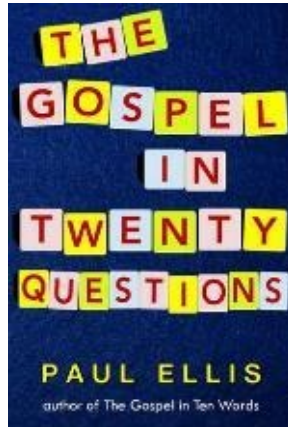


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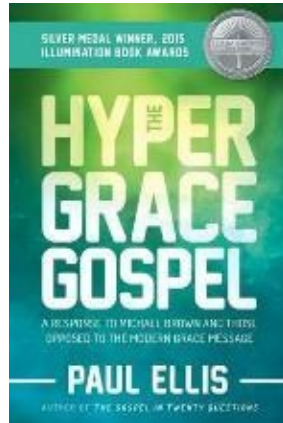


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
